ZONING

As passed at the A.G.M. in Penticton
Aug. 31, 1969

The Province of British Columbia is divided into six zones:

- Zone #1 - Coast Zone
- Zone #2 - Interior Zone
- Zone #3 - Vancouver Island Zone
- Zone #4 - Cariboo Zone
- Zone #5 - Kootenay Zone
- Zone #6 - Northern B.C. Zone

Zone Control:

Archery Clubs in a Zone elect one Delegate from each club from the Active Members in the B.C.A.A. to represent that Club in the Zone. Clubs with 10 or more members in the B.C.A.A. elect two Delegates.

The Zone Chairman, Alternate and Recorder are then elected from these Delegates.

- The Zone Chairman and Recorder for a Two-Year Term.
- The Zone Alternate for a One-Year Term.
- (The Zone Chairman and Recorder to be elected in alternating years)
- The Zone Chairman acts as a Provincial Association Director.

The Zone Delegates and Zone Executive meet as required.

Provincial Control:

All Archery Clubs affiliated with the B.C.A.A. elect their Delegate or Delegates who are to represent their club at the Annual General Meeting. Each Zone Chairman is automatically a Director to Provincial Control. There shall be a Total of 15 Directors on the Provincial Control Board; including an Executive of:

- President - Two Year Term
- Vice-President - One Year Term
- Past President - One Year Term

- Also:
- Secretary - Two Year Term
 - Treasurer - Two Year Term

(Provided the Secretary and Treasurer or Secretary-Treasurer are appointed from within the Board of Directors.)

- The Remainder of - One Year Term

ZONING

The Directors will be elected from and by all the Official Zone Delegates at the Annual General Meeting, (the number required depending on the vacancies created due to the above One or Two Year Terms of office.)

The Executive vacancies occurring at the time of the Annual General Meeting will be filled by and from the Elected Directorate, at each Annual General Meeting. (See By-Law #9.) The President and Secretary to begin their term of office in alternating years.

B.C. ARCHERY ASSOCIATION

By-Law #9

CONSTITUTION

The Board of Directors
(Referred to herein as The Board)

The Board shall consist of the President and the Vice-President, the Immediate Past President, the Secretary and Treasurer or Secretary-Treasurer "If he or they are active members" and a number of Directors chosen as herein described. All Officers and Directors shall be Active Members in good standing.

Should the Office of the Immediate Past President become vacant, the Board shall be validly constituted with the remaining members.

The President and Vice-President shall be elected from the Board for a specified term from the date of the Annual General Meeting and each shall be eligible for re-election to any office.

The Annual General Meeting shall be attended by British Columbia delegates appointed from and by all archery clubs which have become officially associated with the British Columbia Archery Association. Any member may attend the Annual General Meeting but the Board shall be elected from this group of delegates. All delegates must be Active Members. Only delegates may vote and propose resolutions.

Should any vacancy occur in the Board, the remaining members shall continue to act, notwithstanding such vacancy, and the acts of such remaining members shall be valid.

A quorum of the Board shall consist of a majority of the Board then in office.

A resolution in writing assented to by the signature of a majority of the Board, shall be as effectual and of the same force as though it had been duly passed at a meeting of the Board.

To become affiliated with the Society an archery club must have at least three members who are also members of the Society. The club should then advise the Society by letter the name of their President,

By-Law #9 Con't

Vice-President, and Secretary together with the name of their Delegate.

If any member of the Board be called upon to perform extra service or labour, the Board may arrange that such member receives special remuneration for such service or labour either by way of salary, commission or the payment of a fixed sum as they shall think fit.

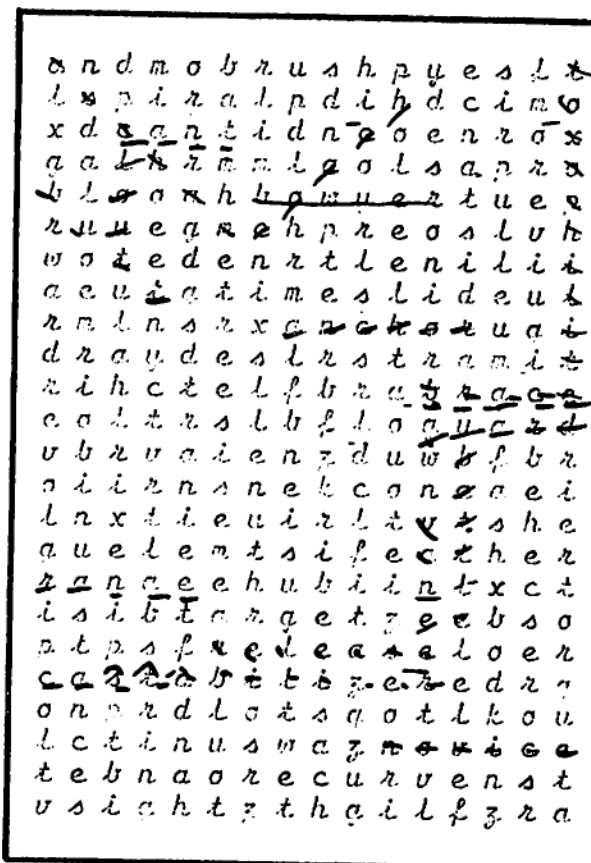

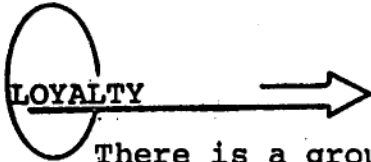
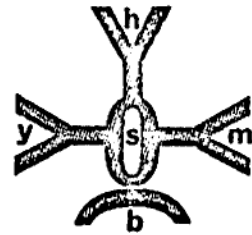

THE LOOKING LISTENER'S

WHAT'S HAPPENING NOW AS I SEE IT



There is a group of archers who belong to more than just one club. Often, this group is regarded as not being loyal to any one group. This attitude of belonging to more than one club is considered wrong. Probably because the critic does not practise this himself. I wonder if the critics have asked themselves why such a roving group exists? What are these travellers trying to prove or accomplish?

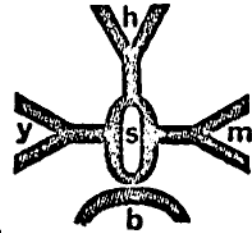
Loyalty, in the context that the critics are expressing themselves, means that the archers are not identified to only one particular base, but to all those clubs "he" is a member of. "He", being a member of many clubs. Although "he" is a member of many groups, "he" tends to indentify himself as a member of one club or the critics will identify "him" as being part of one club, only because "he" shoots at one place more often than at the others. Is that how you interpret and practice the word, "loyalty", by going exclusively to one club? ARE YOU EVER WRONG. More on that later.

The travellers, are able to shoot at many clubs during the week and feel more welcome because he is a member. Non-members are also welcome, but they are usually bombarded with questions and remarks such as, "What brings you out this way?" or "Holy smokes, who have we got here?". These remarks are not said with malice, but are of "poking fun". None the less, these remarks are said. Clubs welcome visitors, but if an archer attends the shooting night, he is expected to join the club. Our friend is in a bit of a situation. He doesn't really want to join, but he wants to shoot on that particular night. Solution;- join the club. Hence, an archer who is a member of many clubs. He is very gently pushed into the situation he is in. He also finds it less expensive, as the target fees are normally less for members than for visitors. He is not trying to prove anything, but he is accomplishing the ability to shoot almost every night of the week and feel as being part of the group because he is a member. And that's how I see it: from their shoes.

DEMONSTRATION TEAM →



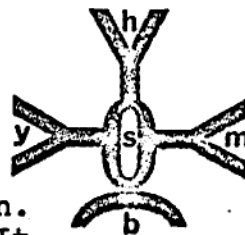
The BCAA has a demonstration team. As I see it, we should not have a demonstration team as such. A team that will represent archery in British Columbia as a whole. I believe that we should have a demonstration team co-ordinator. I have added just one word. CO-ORDINATOR. A co-ordinator is a person who assembles information, analyzes said information, then distributes this data and answers questions or give suggestions as required.

Every reasonably large club has their own demonstration team that performs in their particular area or city. Smaller clubs who are not able to have a demonstration team, asks for assistance from a nearby club. The role that our association should be playing; is one of administration, in lieu of participation. The Olympic Archery Development Program (OADP) is a classic example. The BCAA does not have people from one or two clubs doing all the participation. What they do have, are individual clubs or community centres getting the club instructor to do most of the participation. That is; the instructing, scoring, etc.. The results of a night's shooting is transferred from the instructor to a co-ordinator, namely, Ron Boorman. Ron assembles, classifies, and certifies each member of the program. The program has proven to be a success. The role of the association was administration and participation was done by the various groups or clubs.

The BCAA can competently set up a demonstration team co-ordinator who receives reports from clubs on their individual demonstrations. The report should include; who received the team, how the team performed, step by step, the reaction of the crowd, type of crowd, etc.. The co-ordinator receives the reports from various clubs and analyzes and modifies the performance which had the best response. The revised method is explained, written down, then sent to all the clubs to use. The result will be from; giving archery demonstrations in splinter groups, to archery demonstrations that are well thought out and organized, just like the OADP. Such data is quite often useful in the public relations department when we can achieve enough manpower or womanpower to have such a department.

As I see it, the Maple Ridge Archery Club, Seaview Archers, and Victoria Bowmen are doing all the work, regardless who suggested that they represent the whole of the BCAA, and it seems unfair. Unfair for these clubs at the southern latitudes of our province to represent 31 clubs spreading from VICTORIA to PRINCE GEORGE to MERRITT. I am not quite sure if I like one of 3 clubs say to the receiving public that they represent the entire BCAA. Do you? I have my doubts. Some of you don't.

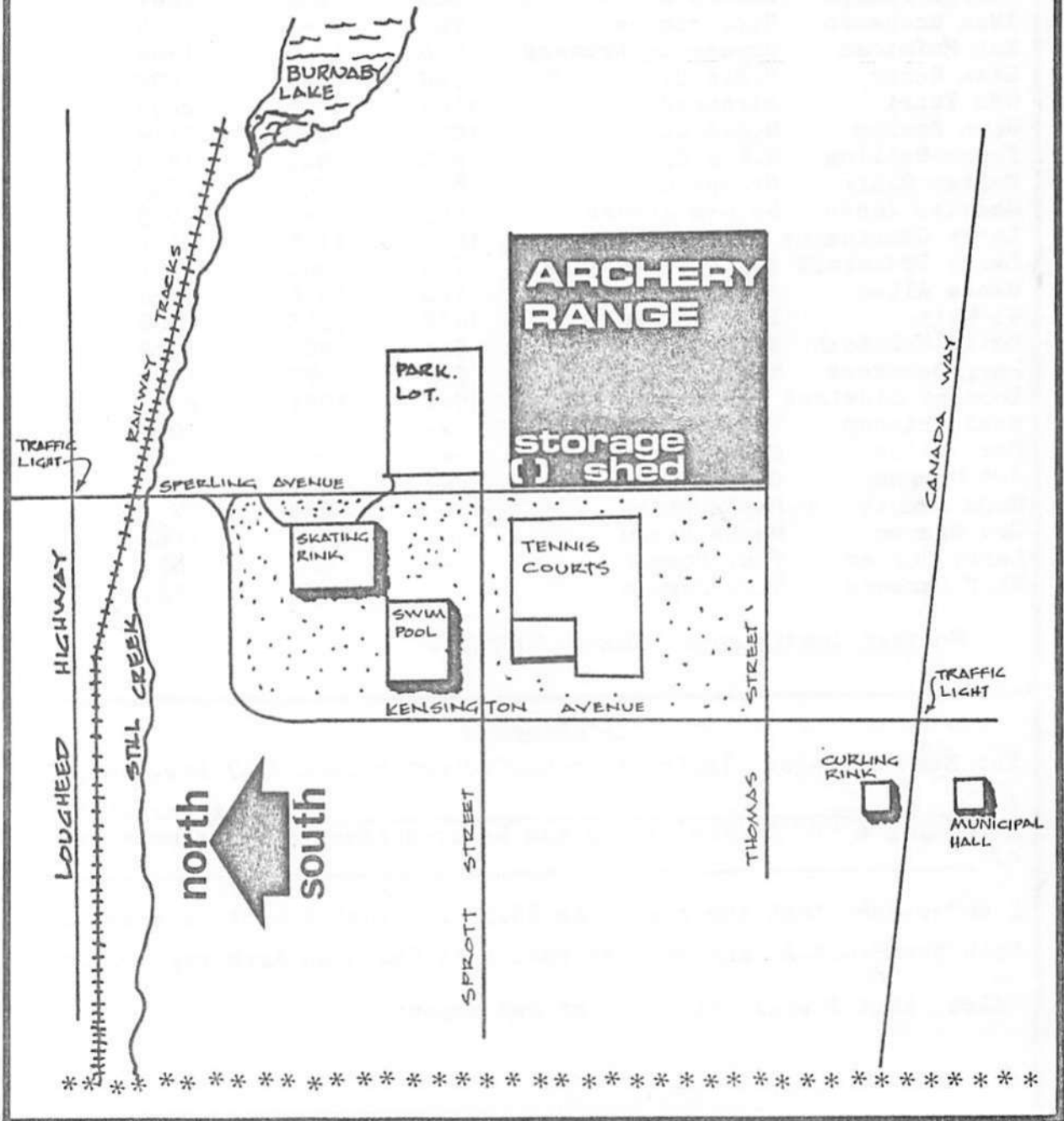

COACH'S CLINIC

QUESTION: How important is it to match arrows to the bow? And how do you go about finding the right arrows?

I have a new bow, same weight as my old one but longer. Both are thirty pounds. My old 1516 arrows fly away to the right. New 1616's fly with terrific side to side wobble. My draw length is 25".

ANSWER: It is of the utmost importance that the arrows match the bow. If they do not, you may find it impossible to get good arrow flight. To find the correct arrows for your bow look at an arrow chart. These are available in most larger archery catalogues. Usually a small range of arrows is given. The choice of arrows may require a little of judgement. A bow with good cast might require a stiffer arrow than a bow with more sluggish cast. I must presume you mean your bow is 30 lbs at your draw length of 25".

Easton's catalogue indicates either 1516's or 1616's should be suitable with a slight preference for the 1516s. You have both sizes, now you must tune the bow.

There are several methods used to tune a bow. You will have more confidence if you use a method recommended by some authority. I will quote the method given by Easton, the arrow shaft maker.

QUOTE: "Start shooting at 30 yards, and after you have sighted in on the target, determine the best string brace height to obtain a compromise between a quiet and fast shooting bow. Twist the string clockwise (from the top loop) enough to raise the brace height one quarter inch and shoot again. Continue raising the brace height until the bow loses appreciable cast and your arrows drop low. Next get a longer string, one that will lower the brace height at least one inch below the bow makers recommended height, and shoot again. If the bow is too noisy or rough shooting, twist the string up, in quarter inch increments, to the original brace height. Somewhere within this range you will find the best compromise of bow speed and quietness. A string should have only 3 to ten turns, so if the proper brace height requires more twist, use a new string of the proper length.

After establishing brace height, move up to exactly five paces from the target. Here, shoot at a small aiming spot that is roughly shoulder level, and check your arrow entry into the bale. If the arrows are entering with the nock end low, your nocking point is too low. Raise it and shoot again. Do this until your arrows enter the bale straight. For arrows that enter the bale with nock end high, merely reverse the procedure. A similar procedure applies to arrows that enter the bale, nock end left or right of centre. If they enter with nock end to the left, then your arrow plate is built out too much (for a right handed archer). Adjust the arrow plate in (or remove some of it) and resume shooting.

COACH'S CLINIC CON'T

Continue to adjust the arrow plate until the shafts enter straight into the target." Unquote.

I modify the above slightly. Easton says "five paces". Does this mean a 36" pace or the natural step of the individual archer? In any case it would have no direct relation to the equipment used. After a lot of pondering and a bit of experiment I find that six arrow lengths is more accurate and is directly related to the arrow used. When shooting, stand with the bow directly above the shooting mark on the ground. The rest of this is reworded from Easton's instructions. Plus some of my own.

Move back to 20 yards and shoot for groups. Shoot toward the sun with both eyes open. This will let you see the arrow flight more clearly. You may wish to make some small further adjustment. (Most archers can't leave will enough alone). Once you are shooting reasonable groups, stop shooting. You have been shooting feathered arrows. Refletch one or two with plastic or rubber. Go and shoot again with the two modified arrows. They should fly like the others. If they do not, first make sure your nocks fit the string properly. They should just "hang" on the string and fall off with a very light tap on the string. Archers are very prone to fit Bjerne nocks too tight because they are loose when "on". But they require some force to push on the string and what is more disasterous, require a lot of pull to release. That causes the string to jerk the arrow back and to the side as it leaves the bow. That causes the arrow to wobble and some times to hit the arrow rest as it passes. If everything is well so far, dash some talcum powder on the area about the rest. Shoot the arrows again and see if the vanes brush the powder off at any point. If they do, adjust the rest out just a little more until the arrows clear the bow and the rest. I wish you the best of success. Remember any normal bow can be made to shoot well, and properly.

QUESTION: I wish to use the new soft fletch on my hunting arrows but cannot get them large enough. So I want to try six of the smaller vanes. Can I get a jig that has six positions and where?

ANSWER: You have one now. Put on three vanes. Take the arrow from the jig, rotate it 180 degrees, put it back in the jig and fletch the other three positions. Six vanes have been tried often in the past. They have seldom proved entirely satisfactory. I suggest you use only three positions but put two or more vanes in tandem at each position.

QUESTION: I am the string maker in our club. I have no trouble serving or finishing the serving but I have a lot of trouble starting.

ANSWER: Others also have that trouble. Pull some thread off your server and lay the server on the far side of the string. Bring the end of the thread over the string, down on this side, under and up on the other side, and back toward you. Tie the thread in a simple overhand

knot around the string. (Overhand knot is what one ties to keep a cord from unravelling). That will hold the start of the serving. Hold the end of the thread along the string and take a few turns with the server in hand. Take up the slack by turning the server's spool backward. Spin the server. This is not quite so neat as the usual way but not conspicuously bad.

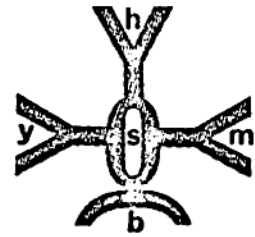
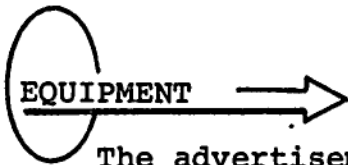

The advertisement of "Muir Archery Supplies", shows a reasonable photograph of the Killian Check-it Sight. In this picture, you are looking at the back of the sight. This particular sighting aid is extremely good in comparison the once-ever-so-popular Reynolds sight. A little more than a year ago, the Reynolds was about the only worthwhile sighting aid around. There were others, and they were better. But what a price you had to pay for what you got! Killian has a block that works on the same principle as Reynolds. To fix the block to the sight bar, you turn a screw which applies pressure to the side of the sight bar. Wind allowance is done by turning the sight pin in the direction desired. The pin is permanently fixed to a threaded shaft. For finer adjustments, you turn the knob you can see on the side of the block at the front of the sight. The knob is divided into quarter turn increments.

The dotted shaft with holes in it is the extension bar. A short bolt (hand turned) screws into these holes and fixes the extension to a metal base screwed (two screws) onto the bow. The Carroll in "Boorman Archery's" advertisement shows what the unit looks like when it is on the bow. By selecting a hole in the extension bar, the archer can put the sight a variety of distances from him. The archer, in effect, has about six different lengths of extensions rolled into one. For long distances, you simply put the sight on the belly side of the bow and put the block upside down. Your sight markings and windage setting will also be affected, but quickly remedied. Simply. It is just a matter of re-marking your distances for outdoors. You could divide the tape of the sight bar in half and use one side for your indoor or close distances and the other half for outdoor distances. This is the reason why this particular unit is popular-----its extremely versatile. Cost for the above is about \$50.00. If you bought a Reynolds and added the same features, it will probably cost you more. When I figured it out, it did. There is also a wide range of sight types (post, with or without level, with or without aperture.).

The "Micrometer Elevation Adjustment" is about three months old. Fine adjustments are done by turning the knob at the top of the sight bar. Large adjustments (to change from 80 yards to 40 yards) don't take an hour because of the fine threading. There is a spring-loaded device which by-passes the threads and you move the block to the desired location. releasing the the device, automatically puts the block onto the controlling threads. If you have an earlier version of the Killian sight, you can convert it to work like the new models.

ISSUES OF OLD CANADIAN ARCHERY ASSOCIATION BULLETINS

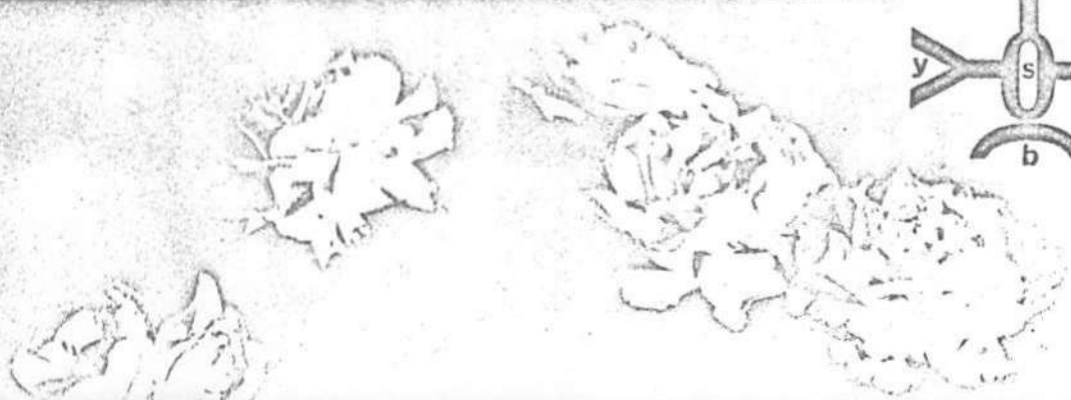
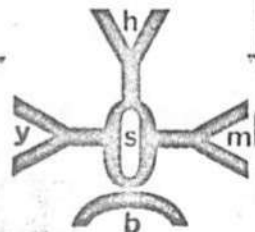
