## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This is just a condensed report to cover activities of the British Columbia Archery Association since our last Annual General Meeting in Vancouver.

Your directors have met on a regular basis and I believe that most of the programs set up earlier in the year are progressing quite well.

The Indoor Championships held in Vernon under Jim Wiebe's chairmanship were a resounding success and we look forward to another great championship in that city.

In the Canadian Indoor Regional Championships, British Columbia Archers earned a major share of the medals and we congratulate the medal winners on their success.

In the Canadian Championships recently held at Edmonton, we had good representation and were particularly

pleased with the showing of our Juniors. While on this topic of the Canadian Championships I must especially commend the dedicated work of Ted McDowell of Vernon as Team Manager and Cliff Allan as Assistant Manager. They did an outstanding job.

Our showing at the Western Canada games in Saskatoon was excellent and though we did not win the gold, both our ladies and men captured 2nd and 3rd places. Here also, we should offer a special vote of thanks to Rose Allan who managed the team to this event.

In the field of officiating, we must mention that our Officials Chairman, Roy Jarvis, has had an exceptionally active year. Probably the highlight of the year in this regard was the fact that Roy was chosen to work on the Technical Commission of the Pan-American Games in San Juan, Puerto Rico. This is probably the first time a National Judge has been chosen to work at an International tournament. In addition to local tournaments, Roy has also worked at the Canadian Championships and the Western Canada Games.

This report must also include special thanks to Dave Webb and Ron Boorman for their work in connection with the budget, including special interviews in Vancouver with the Fitness and Recreation Branch.

Overseas efforts from B. C. must be noted in this report, and I was privileged to act as Team Manager for the Canadian Team to the World Championships in Berlin. It must be recorded here that when one of our members, Phil Talbot had the opportunity to go to Berlin as the fourth man on the team, funding was not available and B. C. rallied behind Phil to make that trip possible. I'm sure it was a great experience for him to stand on the line with the world's best. You can bet he'll try again.

Our Clinics under Dave Mann have made progress and more are in the planning stage. While referring to Dave, I must report that Dave has won a Coaching Scholarship from the Coaching Association of Canada. This again is a first in B. C.

The contribution to Bowhunting

made this year under the direction of Morris Elliott has been excellent. He has dedicated himself to doing a first class job and he keeps you informed through the B. C. Archer. Let's give Morris all the support we can with his bowhunting program.

Funds are always a cause for concern and with this in mind, Vice-President Don Warren initiated a campaign to raffle a trip to Hawaii for two. At the end of this tournament we will determine the success of this effort and hope that Don's venture will be worthwhile. We thank him for this effort.

It has been a busy year and it would be impossible to include in this report all the activities of our members and the work performed by your Board of Directors. I thank you sincerely for all your help and ask one thing for the coming year . . . let's increase the membership of the B.C.A.A. in order that we may go on to greater things.

A special thank you to Helena Myllyniemi our Secretary for many hours of hard work for our Association.

A NUMBER OF ITEMS REGARDING TIMES AND CERTAIN LAST MINUTE SCHEDULES CHANGED WHILE WE WERE AT THE CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS. CONSEQUENTLY, UPON ARRIVING IN SASKATOON, WE AS A TEAM, WERE MISINFORMED ABOUT REGISTRATION AND ARRIVAL TIMES.

AFTER THE INITIAL QUERIES THE GAMES WENT RATHER SMOOTHLY. THE TEAM SHOT 2 FITAS OVER 4 DAYS. A NEW SYSTEM OF TIMING AND LIGHT CONTROL WORTH \$12,000.00 WAS USED, COMPLETELY AUTOMATIC WITHOUT HUMAN ERROR. THE OPERATION AND SET-UP OF THE SHOOT WAS BEYOND COMPARISON.

THE TECHNICAL COMMISSION WAS BEYOND REPROACH. THE SHOOT WAS RUN SIMILAR TO THE OLYMPICS AND FOLLOWED FITA RULES TO THE LETTER.

NOTE: IN FITA RULES IT IS STATED THAT WOMEN MUST WEAR WHITE SKIRTS AND TOPS OR DRESSES, BUT THEY MUST NOT BE TROUSERS. MYSELF ALONG WITH TWO OF THE OTHER TEAM MANAGERS MADE SURE THAT OUR TEAM CAME PREPARED TO SHOOT IN WHITES BUT NEGLECTED THE REFERENCE TO SKIRTS ETC. FOR WOMEN. A DECISION WAS MADE BY THE TC'S TO ALLOW SLACKS ONLY ON THE TARGET RANGE. THIS DECISION BASED UPON THE FACT THAT FEW WOMEN HAD SKIRTS AND FOR THE SAKE OF UNIFORMITY.

- 5/ Scores must be submitted not later than one month after the score is shot.
- 6/ Scores for open records must be shot at National or Regional tournaments. F.I.T.A. Stars and Qualifiers will be eligible at all times, as long as F.I.T.A. rules are followed.
- 7/ B.C. Championship records will be shot at the B.C. Tournament only; they may, however be included for open records.

## CLUB HINTS

by T.W. Melosky

### How to Repair a Hollow Stabilizer or Invisible T.F.C.

Has this happened to You?

About six months ago I had the misfortune of dropping my bow. (I won't elaborate on the event --- shades of embarrassment.)

The damage to my equipment was a lot less than the damage to my ego. Upon impact the quarter inch set screw (which secures the stabilizer to the bow) broke off flush with the insert in the stabilizer; plus it cracked lengthwise about one inch at the insert.

I used a tube cutter and removed about two inches from the damaged end of the stabilizer and then I attempted to salvage the insert by drilling a hole through the set screw and removing it with an easy-out (bolt extractor). I tried using a hand held drill and bench vise, but my attempt was a failure because of improper tools. I should have used a drill press.

With our club shooting twice a week, I could not afford to order a new insert and perhaps wait a week or two for delivery.

On went the thinking cap --- I adapted a method used in the Mining Industry for securing grout plugs into one and a half inch holes in rock.

I substituted a bolt for pipe and scaled down their method to suit my requirements.

Figure A shows material used - one only  $\frac{1}{4}$  x  $\frac{2}{8}$  inch coarse thread bolt complete with nut and FLAT washer, plus a piece of rubber gas line tubing  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch inside diameter by  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch outside diameter by  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches long.

Figure B shows that when assembled and tightened the rubber expands, getting a larger outside diameter.

Figure C shows adapter inserted and tightened. into stabilizer and ready for use.

By loosening the tension on the nut you achieve the same results as a torque flight compensator. To use this as a T.F.C. one would have to apply an adhesive to the rubber tubing to ensure the stabilizer would not work its way loose on the adapter while experimenting to find the desired amount of tension between stabilizer and bow.

I was very pleased with the results of this inexpensive repair and hope that other fellow archers might benefit from it also.



- ① 1/4 inch coarse thread nut (U.N.C.)
- ② 1/4 inch flat washer
- ③ Rubber gas line (1/4 inch I.D. X 1/2 inch O.D. X 2 1/4 inch long)
- ④ 1/4 inch X 2 1/2 inch coarse thread bolt (U.N.C.)

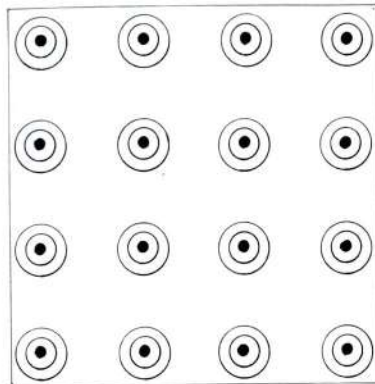
diameter it would have been much less than the overall length, making the sight illegal by the interpretations.

This issue will go in front of Congress at the next sitting and a specific additional interpretation will be given. However, in the interim, my opinion is that the above-mentioned sight is legal and it would

become illegal only if the inside plastic was totally opaque. Therefore, specifically, the inside diameter of a tube in that portion of the tube to which light and vision is readily transmitted.

It is very important that it be clearly understood that this is not an official F.I.T.A. interpretation. Though I am a member of the F.I.T.A. Rules and Regula-

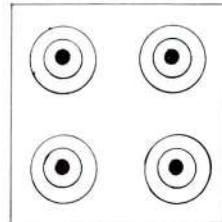

The Rabbit 15cm faces - The first two archers will shoot columns 1 and 3 from top to bottom - arrows in numerical rotation. The second two will shoot columns 2 and 4 in the same order.

Archers A and C shoot the left position throughout and B and D shoot the right position. (except for the fans)

50cm faces - The first two arrows are shot into the top target and the third and fourth arrows are shot into the bottom target. When the two archers approach the shooting stake, the right archer shoots into the right targets and



the left archer uses the left targets. Be sure your arrows are shot in numerical rotation.

45cm and 60cm faces -

Arrow rotation does not apply when shooting at the larger targets.

**OFFICIATING**

NOTE: Under Canadian rules, no buttress may be approached until all arrows have been shot.

# the Coaches Clinic

## The Coaches Clinic

One of my archers has been shooting fingers. He now has a release aid. He has opted to apply it to the string above the arrow. He used to nock under the nock point marker, so his finger held the arrow up. With the release aid, he had trouble with the arrow slipping down the string before he could draw. I took the obvious solution and applied another marker below the arrow, allowing only working clearance for the nock. Silly me! I know better than that. Do you?

With the release aid pulling above the arrow, the arrow is on the part of the string that points to the lower bow tip. That sits at an angle of about 45 degrees. The markers were so close, they held the nock and tipped the arrow up off the rest. The lower marker was moved down to give clearance and all is OK. The markers will probably need to be moved when the bow is tuned after the archer gets used to his new set up.

We get the same fault in reverse when the release aid or fingers are applied below the arrow. I have often seen a drawn arrow with a bend that was blamed on too much top finger pressing down, when it was really pressed down on the rest by either a release aid or finger pull below the nocking point. Then the arrow either bounced up at release or the rest collapses. In any case, it can cause up and down inconsistency. Check it if you use two markers.

To gain relaxation, many archers pick up their feet and replace them for the next arrow. That is natural and often subconscious to do and it does relieve some tension. But surely the feet could be replaced in the same place relative to the shooting line!

At a tournament in March, I was watching feet. Some archers place feet very carefully end after end and arrow after arrow. Others varied 2" or more from end to end. One man adjusted his feet about an inch closer to the line and the target for each arrow. So what?

Let us go to the target. The arrow strikes at a downward angle with possibly 24" projecting, and the nock end on the longer distances is in some cases, 3" or 4" higher than the hole in the target. That means that if the target were 24" closer to the line, the arrow on the same trajectory would have struck 3" or 4" higher on the target. That means a discrepancy of 1/8" for every inch the archer stands closer or farther from the target. That, in turn, makes a difference of one point when the arrow is near or cuts the line on the target. Perhaps you should be more

carefull in placing your feet! The experts are. But then, maybe you are better than the experts?

\* \* \* \* \*

**QUESTION:** When I passed my exams for my Instructor certificate, it was not made clear or I did not understand how to make left-right adjustments of a stick-on arrow rest like the Hoyt. Please explain if it can be done.

**ANSWER:** The question asked in the above letter is less important than the problem revealed. I will answer the question first.

To adjust a stick-on rest: Having established its position fore and aft, up and down, and the best angle to set it, mark round it so you can remove and replace it in exactly the same place. A crayon line round it or a spurt of spray powder will mark it temporarily. But you will often have to replace it as it wears out, especially if you use one of the plastic ones. They do wear out quickly.

A better mark is to place a narrow strip of surgical tape, just touching it along the lower edge and possibly along one end. No! Not on it. Just touching its position. Now you can lift it off. Apply a layer of carpet tape to the back of it. Trim all round with scissors and stick it back on in the same place. You can add layer after layer to build the rest out until your arrows fly straight from the bow. Count the number of layers you add and prepare a spare rest the same way. Leave the covering pull-off strip on the last layer so it doesn't get dirty.

Now for the problem. This person failed to ask her instructor at the clinic how to do the job. Possibly because she didn't want to appear stupid before the rest of the class. My advice when you do not know or understand is to ask them and there. There are several reasons for doing so.

1. You will never get an earlier chance to find the answer.
2. You may be the only one in the class with enough brains to recognise there is a question to be asked.
3. It will give a possibly needed break in the monotony of the lesson.
4. It will let the clinic conductor know you are alert.
5. The clinic conductor may not be infallible and a question will let him know where he has missed a point. He will appreciate your asking.

Perhaps you are timid about asking or doing anything you are not sure you should. My philosophy is to go ahead and do anything you want to. All that can happen is that you will be stopped or reprimanded if it is not allowed. That will be done politely, which is reasonable and acceptable. Or it will be done rudely which will only reveal the character of the person doing it, and that doesn't matter.

**DID YOU KNOW?** The so called broad arrow with which so much government and military equipment is marked is technically not a broad head. It is called a pheon (pronounced fay-on). The cutting blades are well separated from the centre rib and the bars were on the inside of the blades, between the cutting blades and the centre rib. A dreadful thing to get half way through you.

2. You must pre-register by December 31, 1979.
3. You must submit your scores by deadlines, February 10 & March 10, 1980.
4. You must submit a minimum of 8 scores each month.
5. You are not buying your medal this year; you have to shoot for it so lets all get the bow tuned up and get at it.

If there is enough money in the account at the end of all this, I will purchase a plaque to honor the club that totals up with the most points at the end of the mail match. Also, I will try and have something for those entries that finish. Thanking the B.C.A.A. very much. Maybe start a thank you very much club that could continue in years to come.....

tions Committee, I myself cannot make any further interpretations of the F.I.T.A. Rules. This can only be done by the World Congress or if an interpretation is required between the World Congresses, (which falls every two years plus Olympic years) it will be done by the appropriate Committee. Target Archery Rules will be covered by the Rules and Regulations Committee, Field Archery Rules will be covered by the World Field Committee.

I do not feel this issue is at all unclear; therefore, I do not feel it is in fact an interpretation. It is just a statement of the Rule.

In each and every National or Provincial Judges Seminar, we have repeatedly mentioned that the important issue on a rule is the intent of the Rule and whether or not the questionable item can, in fact, afford an additional aid in sighting, levelling, or whatever. This particular combination of clear lens and tube cannot in any way afford any advantage to the archer, more than he would receive with a single pin in the center of the nose tube. Therefore, I feel it would be against the principle of sound judging and rule interpretation to only what then would be a ridiculous rule interpretation.

# Why Rules?

Late in 1976 an archer appeared on a World Tournament Line with a piece of aluminum arrow shaft cut off to approximately an inch and a half overall length with a fine bead sight inside. He was using the bead for aiming at the target and the inside wall of the tube as a secondary aligning device. Obviously, if he was not precisely in line behind the tube he would see an oval shaped hole rather than a round hole and this would be a substantial advantage to him. If that had been allowed, then a precedent would have been set and it would be a small matter for an archer to have a 6" or 8" long tube with the pin in the center, which would require absolute alignment in order to see the target. That would certainly be equivalent to a peep sight on the string, which becomes dual sighting. Hence, the DA interpretation on page 71 of your new F.I.T.A. Constitution and Rules.

Of course, as soon as an interpretation is made, archers will attempt to find an exception and we have already had to rule on two or three combinations that fall in this category. One specifically was an archer using an approximately W" diameter (inside) tube with not more than a W" overall length which, in itself, is legal. However, inside of the main tube was a piece of clear plastic with a very small hole in the center. The hole then became the actual single sighting point. Then if you rated the hole as the minimum inside

At the 1977 F.I.T.A. Congress a new interpretation was passed regarding sights, dealing specifically with tube sights.

Specifically, F.I.T.A. sees a sighting aid as a single point sight on the bow which may be adjustable, but may not serve a dual purpose.

Therefore, obviously the sight which incorporates a level, is not legal. The old Bear cross-hair sight, which incorporates a pendulum and can be used for levelling, is not legal. A sight pin with an electrically illuminated end (the type used by hunters for poor light conditions), is not legal, and certain variations of the aperture sight are illegal.

The specific reference in the F.I.T.A. book is Article 703d(1) and Article 808b(1)d, e.g. the length of any sight (ring, barrel, conical, hood, etc.) shall not exceed the minimum inside diameter of the aperture. A hood is not to exceed the length of 1 cm. irrespective of shape. The two articles mentioned above deal with Field and Target archery and specifically with sights, but did not mention specifically dimensions of sights.

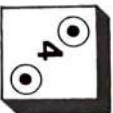

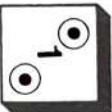

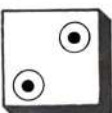

# Bowhunting up North



Hi Fellow Bowhunters

Well, it's the beginning of September and the northland is just beginning to show the yellows and reds of autumn. You can feel the change from summer to fall by the slight chill in the mornings. Our pre season for bull moose and buck deer is in full swing and I've gotten in two days hunting and saw one cow moose. The overall hunting regulations for moose this year are very similar to last years so I wonder what has happened to the new plans for a better moose management program?

Possibly it is too soon to expect our "Minister of The Environment" Raif Mair to respond to his new plan but I did notice that Mr. Mair was very quick to make one change. Mr. Mair has announced that he is returning to poisoning wolves and coyotes. Not only that but he has also added the dastardly black bear to his poison list. He believes in "maximizing chosen species of wildlife" which is the principal of elimination of all

predators and also other species that interfere with the chosen species. Now this principal of kill off the unwanted in hopes of increasing the good animals has been tried in the past and the program failed in the past. So lets give Mr. Mair a shiny medal for one giant step backwards in the fight for conservation.

No one should believe for one moment that only predators will be going down the tube because the minister also wants to introduce commercial ranching of moose and deer. Be very sure that the only way that ranching moose and deer on a commercial scale can be accomplished is for the commercial interests to use and control present wildlife habitat. And that means even the chosen species will be losing more wild habitat. We don't want wildlife preserved in ranches. If that's all we wanted

all that would be needed is a few more zoos around the province.

Just selling and killing off our natural heritage of wildlife strictly for a buck is indeed a step backwards. Sure, economics are involved with any activity be it the forest industry or wildlife. But how about some emphasis on method hunting areas to increase hunter numbers and dollar value. How about selling to the rest of the world that B. C. is one of the very few remaining corners of the earth that has wildlife in good numbers in wild habitat. There is millions to be made each year from programs like photography guided trips and tourists just being able to see wildlife in wild areas. Lets use economic means that will enhance our rich heritage of wildlife, not use ways to eliminate some species with the false belief it will conserve the others. The commercial ranching of deer and moose will not help but hasn't the day when B. C. will be without wildlife in wild areas. Lets use and promote canoe trips, river boat trips, back packing trips, horse back trips, and powered vehicle trips. It's all here to build a sound economic base

for building the preservation of wildlife. Lets for a change try some positive ideas instead of negative.

Now I would like to write about the lighter and more enjoyable side of what makes this land of ours so precious.

This summer Dot and I did more fishing then we usually find time for and we caught a fair share of fish. We also had a fantastic two week holiday in the Yukon. I kept a diary of the trip and although it will be a lengthy story I will send it into the Archer as maybe some will enjoy a little story about the land north of us.

Getting back to the fishing we enjoy a good feed of fresh trout, char, or greyling but most of all we enjoy smoked fish. People have different tastes as to how they prefer smoked fish. Some prefer a heavy smoked flavor and some like the fish quite salty. Dot and I have experimented quite a bit and have come up with a combination we both like.

The taste is mostly controlled with the curing. For about eight

pounds of fish we settled with a four to one brine. The brine consists of one half cup of pickling salt and two cups of brown sugar. Dissolve the brine salt and brown sugar with a couple of cups of hot water. The salt takes a bit of stirring to dissolve but once it is dissolved put it all into a glass bowl big enough to easily hold the fish. If the fish are a pound or lighter, just half then down the spine and if larger just fillet them. Then add cold water to the bowl of fish and brine until the fish are covered. Then pop it all into the frig for overnight or eight to ten hours.

When the fish are cured take them out of the bowl and pat dry and then lay them out to further dry for half an hour. Basically there are two types of fish smokers. One is a cold smoker where the smoke is piped into the smoker and thereby avoiding heat and partial cooking. The other is a hot smoker where smoking wood chips and smoke racks are in the same container and therefore a small amount of heat partially cooks the fish as well as smoking it. Ours is a hot smoker and we smoke the fish about

four to six hours depending on the thickness of the fish. Only non pitch wood like hickory, apple, birch can be used for smoking.

That's about all there is to it but you can vary the curing solution with spices, salt, and sugar to your personal taste. With our four to one brine solution and four to six hours smoking the fish has a slightly salty taste as well as slightly sweet taste. It's just like peanuts in that once you start eating, the whole bowl just disappears. Even people who don't like fish eat our smoked fish.

It seems to me I write as much about other things as archery. So I hope you people enjoy the non archery things as well. However this summer hasn't been without the bow as I have got a few more rabbits as well as shooting the gopher derby that Don Harper won again. Also Don and his wife have donated a real fine club trophy to our club for the top junior shooter in the gopher derby. Orma and Tom McKenzie also did another real fine job of setting up the gopher derby and once again we thank them both.

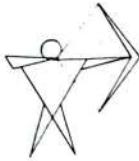
