Ottawa Bowmen "Shoot Off"

The Ottawa Bowmen Incorporated got their archery season off to a lively start with an invitation tournament on June 6 and 7th, and for once the archers got off without a drenching. Of course, there were a few raindrops for no tournament would be a success without, but that was a mere nothing compared with other years.

Because of park and road construction, both target and field ranges had to be completely relocated in the space of a couple of weeks, in order to be ready for the advertised dates of the meet, and that meant a lot of hard work. But every tribulation brings its own recompense, they say, and one result is a smaller, tighter but far more pleasing field course. The one big drawback is POISON IVY, as half a dozen members can attest. How do you get rid of the noxious weed when there is scarcely a square yard free of it?

For geographical reasons, Montreal, Three Rivers, Lanark and Ottawa have had to rely on one another for inter-club meets, and while this somewhat restricts the field of competition, still it has resulted in a real spirit of comraderie between the clubs. As for competition, friendship, it seems, serves to sharpen it, or is it vice versa?

Mr. J. A. Dulude, Ottawa's Parks Commissioner, presided at the opening of the target event at the new Mooney's Bay Park on Saturday. Visibly impressed by the participation of three of Mon- treal's paraplegic archers, Mr. Dulude expressed the hope that Ottawa citizens in the same situation might be persuaded to take up the sport. This is a challenge the Ottawa Bowmen hope to do something about.

On Sunday, the activities were transferred to the field course near Stittsville on Highway 15. A field round was shot in the morn- ing and a big game in the afternoon. The interval between was devoted to feeding the animal on Chili Con Carne and cole slaw. The last event on the program was the novelty and it was a dilly. A fine length of steel wire had been run through the dense growth, marked at intervals with minute bits of white tape. The archers set out in teams at four minute intervals, a team consisting of a tracker, a scorer and a checker. The idea was to find a marker, locate the target which was a drawing of a rabbit's head well camou- flaged, and place an arrow in the scoring ring for one point. Each man was allowed one arrow to each target. Time was of the essence, for a team overtaken by the following one had to let the speedier one go through. There was a hidden time limit as well, and always the chance that a good score might be disqualified because the team had run a few seconds overtime. Just to confuse the issue a bit further, the live rabbit population was very much in evidence that day, and it took the greatest will-power to reserve one's arrows for paper targets with such lively bait scampering about literally under- foot! The biggest surprise came at the end of the event, when the winner turned out to be 12-year-old Ted MacMillan, who scored 22 hits, deflating in no uncertain terms his sire who only scored 14.
