CARP DERBY — MAY 28th and 29th

It seems that the time of year for the very different shoot has arrived again and finds many archers in the varied stages of preparation. The Carp Derby.

The event is due to the kindness of the Department of Lands and Forests who saw fit to grant this season to the Ontario archers. The only place it is open is in Essex County and there is where the Derby takes place.

The location is Cedar Beach about 18 miles from Windsor at the Cedar Beach Lodge, where the Windsor Bowmen have contracted for the Lodge for the two days. There are accommodations right in the Lodge, and also there are cabins as well as tenting space available.

A very competent committee has made the numerous and varied arrangements this year which include everything from Coast-to-Coast Television coverage, very ample Newspaper coverage, dancing on the Saturday night to one of Windsor's most popular dance bands, Johnny Sherwood and His Foresters. Prizes have been collected—and they are a very choice lot with no prize begin under the five dollar limit. You may be a winner!

The equipment is not too expensive and there can be no value placed on the fun that is to be had.

This year the derby has its confines and within those confines the shooting must be done. This is definitely where the carp will be shot and anyone violating this will have to answer to the March Captain. There is a new office! PETTICOAT PATTERN

Planning on making this year's trips to the shoots a series of camping sprees? What better way to travel and save your hard earned shekels at the same time? Of course, your initial expenditure will be purchasing the tent. This is an item which will pay you to investigate before you buy. An inexpensive type is certainly good for those camping on a budget but if the better quality can be afforded it will pay off in longer wear, lighter weight and many other conveniences. The latter type generally have such features as sewed-in floors, zippered doors and screened windows—some of them even boast a separate dining area with "picture windows" of nylon mesh! The average cost of a tent sleeping two is around \$60 but can cost anywhere from \$20 to \$120 depending upon design, material, etc. Some dealers display tents where the price will include two zippered sleeping bags but if you have to buy your own they will cost in the neighbourhood of \$10 to \$20. To this cost add a \$15 for the stove plus a few more dollars for cutlery, crockery and your pots and pans. Your location is no problem—most of the clubs have excellent camping facilities, to mention a few, Brant Bowmen, Galt Bowmen and York County Bowmen. Check on their facilities with club members next time you meet at a shoot and store this information away for future reference.

Was talking to George Smith (H. & F.A.O. Hunting Chairman) the other day and was very surprised to learn that only a small percentage of the H. & F.A.O. members have put in their applications for the Small Game Awards and even at that, three of them were women! Talking of women—believe a separate category should be set up for those interested and perhaps more will try for these awards. What's the matter with the clubs that they are not promoting interest in hunting with the bow? Feel they are missing out on a good publicity angle here. In some cases people just DON'T KNOW how to hunt but would be willing to learn. In my own club we have both Large and Small Game awards based on a similar point system to that used by the H. & F.A.O., the awards being two plaques presented each year at our annual banquet. Our hunting chairman keeps track of the various kills and is also responsible for arranging partridge shoots, etc. for the club members. I know the Nomad Archers of Orillia have a similar set up and are taking steps to purchase their own hunt camp—would be very interested in hearing from the other clubs and know what they are cookin' up to promote and encourage hunting with the bow.

Ever thought of holding a Visitors' Day at your club? Good opportunity to invite the local press and others even remotely interested in archery. Explain your field course to them and put on a small demonstration, etc.

A gentle reminder, people, why not pick up some of our glasses as prizes for your shoots. These glasses depict an archer in action and are, I know, always appreciated by the winners as they are both practical and decorative. Contact the Editor for prices, etc.

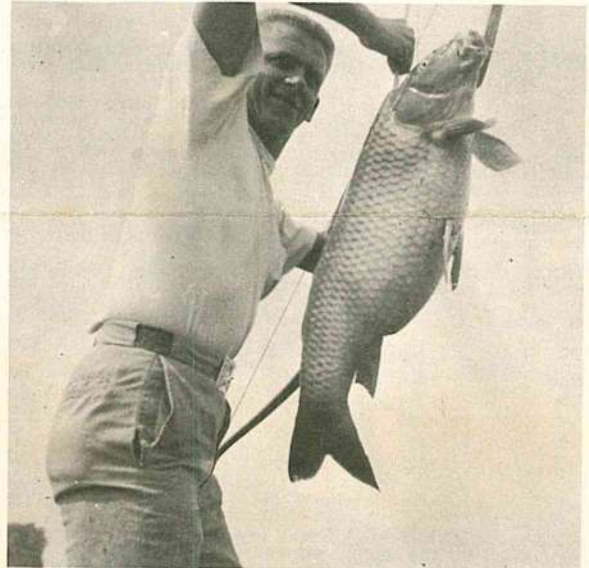

Time again for my report. We had our spring representatives' meeting on Sunday, April 10th at the Galt Sportsmen's Club, so shall report some of the outcomes of this meeting.

Representatives present were: Brant Bowmen, George McGowan and Les Dunsdon; Chemical Valley Bowmen, Frank Serratore; Dunnville Bowmen, Reg. Edie; CA NU PA Fellowship, Doug Jarrard and Norm Goody; Bowmen of London, Stan and Donna Stevens; King's Forest Archers, Vic Kolmar; York County Bowmen, Gerry Annett; Galt Bowmen, Ron Macdonald; West Elgin Bowmen, George Smith; Forest City Archers, Joan Harrison; East Kent Bowmen, John Puttock and Clair Simpson; Humber Valley Archers, Ernie Happe; Ontario Target Assn., Don Bloomfield.

As you can see, turnout was fair but could have been better.

CLASSIFICATIONS—John Randall presented a new classification system, on a number basis rather than expert, bowmen, etc. This idea would also do away with the classes of Free Style and Instinctive, except in the highest class. For 28 targets, field round, they would set up as follows:—

Those represented thought this idea was worth a try, and will be the way you will be classed for the coming season.

CRESTS—Along with our new idea of scoring, we will have new crests that will go along with this idea very nicely. There will be a standard crest, to be presented to EVERYONE entering the mail matches UPON ATTAINING THE LOWEST CLASS SCORE. There will be no crest for winner, only a crest, with a bar or patch showing your class and progress.

THREE RING TARGETS—Les Dunsdon was along to explain to us how these targets can be made up from the old faces. George Hoy will explain this fully in his bulletin to be sent out with the outdoor matches which you will no doubt have received by this time. The field scoring will be 5—4—3. On Broadhead Scoring, it will remain the same, using only the two rings as before.

The Team Shoot will again be held in Brantford, in conjunction with their Indian John Shoot, to be held June 19th.

The Handicap Shoot will also again be held at the same time as the St. Thomas shoot. They will make an exception this year, whereby anyone unable to attend this shoot will be able to enter on a mail match on any registered course. Fees will be 75c for seniors and 50c for juniors.

Also at this time I would request that any club wishing to put in a bid to hold the championships, please let me know by August 1st, or sooner if possible.

Another new club in our midst—The Nomad Archers of Orillia, Ont. They are relatively new, but we hope soon to have them with us in the H. & F.A.O. Also, I have correspondence from the Skramrud's of Northern Ontario, who were with Canadian Lakehead, and they have moved to Dryden and are trying to form another club there. Good luck.

Reg Edie informs us that he is working on an Honor Roll for all those who have been active with the H. & F.A.O. who have passed away. Reg. also pointed out this is the 20th year of operation for the H. & F.A.O., so we will certainly have to celebrate this fact come convention time. Reg. is a hard worker for archery and the H. & F.A.O., and is to be highly commended for his time and efforts.

Well that's about all for this time, don't forget to get out there and get in the mail matches. Good shooting.

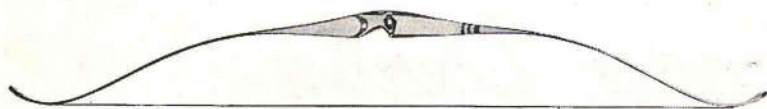
