Message from the President:

A giant among the problems that the C.A.A. is currently facing is the problem of communications. There is no point in dwelling on the repeated failures of archery publications in Canada. Suffice is to say that the inability to communicate with the members has been the largest stumbling block to the Executive of the C.A.A. since the formation of the Society. The reliance on these publications and the subsequent disappointments are, I am sure, self-evident to the membership.

The action now taken by your executive to overcome this problem is the only alternative left to the board, and that is to put the Canadian Archery Association in the publishing business. Recognizing that few of us, and least of all myself, have very little experience in this line of endeavor, we will try to make up for quality by giving you the most important part of a publication - regularity.

Every member of the C.A.A. can help with the Bulletin. Send us news of your club, news of other clubs in your area and also pass along these bulletins to any one you might think interested in reading them.

Repeatedly you have been asked to support the C.A.A. - to participate in mail matches, etc., and I know that repeatedly you have been disappointed in the outcome, but with Dickson at the helm of the infant publication (The Bulletin) and his devoted wife Helen in charge of mail matches, and with many new faces on the Board, we are going for another try. With your support if we do not make a good showing, put our heads on the block at the next General Meeting.

Our program for 1965 is as follows:

- (a) A complete overhaul of the bowhunting and bowhunting award program and an effort to recruit more bowhunting members.
- (b) An exhaustive survey of our field program and regulations.
- (c) An Instruction program. We have an application in the hands of the Fitness Council for financial assistance to hold Instruction Seminars in each Province. We have also appointed our first Examiner for Instructors and shortly will publish the names of the Examiners in each Province.
- (d) 1965 World Championships: We hope to send a larger and more representative team to the World shoot in Sweden this year. This ambitious scheme is expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000.00 and is a tall order for an association which four years ago boasted a yearly budget of less than \$2,000.00 - yet such is the faith which the average member has shown in this society in the past that it has lent confidence to the present executive to tackle so large a project. In two world wars Canadian servicemen have spread abroad the image of the average Canadian as a generous, hail-fellow-well-met, good sportsman type of individual. The preservation of this image is not the reason we wish to send a team to the world tournament, and yet there are few higher goals to which we could aspire. Let us all, each one of us, try our best to make this a successful program.

C. A. A. Constitution

The amended Constitution has now been completed and this Chapter of the Handbook is ready for mailing. As mentioned in the December Bulletin, members may obtain Chapter 27, which is the Constitution, by forwarding 10 cents in stamps to the Secretary.

Please do not send cheques as the exchange costs 15 cents. As additional Chapters are completed they will be made available to members for 10 cents to cover cost of mailing and handling.

Membership Expiry Date

As a result of the balloting on this question all memberships will expire December 31st of each year. Therefore archers should send in their 1965 membership fees immediately. The following constitutional changes as recommended at the General Meeting in Joliette, have been approved by the general membership.

Article IV para. 3: Memberships shall expire on December 31st of each year.

Article XVI Para. 5(F) Canadian Hunters Round
The value of the scoring shall be:
First arrow in inner ring 20; in outer ring 16
Second " " " 14; " " " 10
Third " " " 8; " " " 4

Article XVI para. 3(H) Ties shall be broken by the greatest number of hits in the aiming point, which hits are to be marked with an "x" on the score card when scoring.

Article VI para. 7. That if only one competitor competes in an event, that unless the score of said competitor comes within 5% of the Canadian Record, no award need be given.

Article VIII para. 1. These By-laws, pages 4 to 21 inclusive, may be amended or revised by a two-thirds vote of the members present at an annual business meeting at which a quorum of Directors are present; or at other times by a two-thirds vote of the total membership taken by mail ballot. It shall not be necessary to present a prior notice of motion in order to amend the By-laws.

Members will be glad to know that these amendments have been made in the copies of the Constitution which is now available to the members.

Selection of Canadian Team for 1965 World Championships:

Although the decision of the Federal Government concerning our submission for a grant to assist our team has not yet been made known, the C.A.A. is going ahead with plans to select a team of 4 men, 4 women, 1 team manager and 1 coach.

Although the ideal method of picking a team would be a central tournament to which all interested archers would be invited, this method is not financially possible either from the stand point of the archers who would have to pay their own way, or from the point of view of the C.A.A. Not sufficient archers would be able to attend to make it worth while.

The C.A.A. is selecting the team from the results of five elimination shoots held simultaneously across Canada. The round to be shot will be the FITA Round and it will be shot under International Rules. Judges will be appointed by the C.A.A.

First elimination shoot: The first shoot will be held the end of May or the first week in June.

In order to equalize climatic conditions across Canada, arrangements are being made to wash out shoots if the wind velocity is greater than 15 miles per hour. Shoots will be organized so that it will be possible to postpone from Saturday to Sunday if the weather is adverse.

It is hoped that with five trials, each region should have its share of weather and the average score should be a fair indication of the archers ability.

Any archer wishing to try out for the team should contact the Secretary as soon as possible.
