Canadian Team for World Championships

First on the agenda at the executive meeting in Edmonton was the selection of the Canadian team for the tournament in Sweden July 19th to 24th.

THREE ELIMINATION TOURNAMENTS

After much deliberation it was decided to use the scores from three elimination shoots to select the team of four men and four women. Each Provincial Association will decide the dates and the location of their elimination tournaments. Provincial associations have from May 22nd to June 20th to hold three shoots. The first shoot is not to be prior to May 22nd and the last shoot must be before June 20th. Provincial associations will decide whether or not they wish to have two Fita rounds on one weekend. This would make it possible for archers who had a long distance to travel to get two rounds shot on the one weekend.

The round to be shot will be the FITA round and will be shot under FITA rules. FITA rules will appear in the next issue of the Bulletin, but archers who are interested in competing for a place on the Canadian team should train without the use of sights which embody a lens or a prism. Microhole glasses for use while shooting will not be allowed. Draw checks may be used, but bow levels will not be allowed.

THE FITA ROUND

For those archers who wish to practice the FITA round and who are not familiar with the distances or faces, we print the following:

Eligibility:

Competitors must be amateurs as set out in the Olympic Game Regulations.

Competitors must be Canadians.

Competitors must be members of the C.A.A.

Officials:

The C.A.A. will appoint a judge, who in turn will appoint non-participating witnesses for each target.

Climatic Conditions:

In order to equalize climatic shooting conditions, arrangements have been set up to postpone an elimination shoot under certain unfavorable weather conditions.

RESERVATIONS FOR CANADIAN TEAM

The C.A.A. started in December making reservations for the team at Vasteras. We now have reservations for 16 at the championship city, so if any archers would like to travel with the team and see the tournament, please contact Terry Dickson.

DATES OF DEPARTURE FROM CANADA

Due to July being the busy season for airlines the C.A.A. will have to wait until the end of this month before the exact date of departure will be known. Reservations to fly from Montreal on July 15th were tentatively booked about a month ago, but it may be necessary for the team to leave Montreal on July 13th or 14th. Archers hoping to make the team should book holidays so that they can leave from Montreal July 13th if necessary.

The tournament is over July 24th and arrangements can be made to detour before returning to Canada. However, team members will be required to travel from Montreal together, so that they will arrive together.

PASSPORTS AND VACCINATIONS

Archers hopeful of making the Canadian team to Sweden should apply for passports well in advance. Passports are good for ten years and if you do not use it this year, you might be lucky in 1967.

Vaccinations are good for three years and there is no need to wait until you know that you have made the team. Get it over with now so that your bow arm won't be stiff during the eliminations.

Travellers are able to bring back \$100.00 duty free goods.

However you are only allowed 44 lbs of luggage so don't start packing that trunk.

COACHING CLINICS

Another major item on the agenda at the executive meeting in Edmonton was the coaching clinics. Good progress was made and it was gratifying to note the wholehearted support and co-operation between the C.A.A. and provincial associations.

Provincial associations have been asked to advise the C.A.A. when they would recommend a coaching clinic in their respective provinces. The first clinic in each province will be held to familiarize prospective instructors with the C.A.A. Handbook and basic methods of instructing archery. Provincial associations will have a free hand at setting the dates and the location of each clinic. The personnel at the clinics will be the examiners appointed in that province; the Regional Director appointed in that province and the archers who have applied to the C.A. for Instructors certificates. The clinics will be two-day affairs and it is expected that they will be held in May.

The examination paper for the first instructors has been set and it is planned to test the prospective instructors at the completion of the two-day clinic. Instructors certificates and special shoulder flashes will be presented to the successful applicants.

It is hoped that the provincial associations will carry on with regular coaching clinics. The provincial representatives were briefed on the method of applying for aid from the Provincial Fitness and Outdoor Education Departments to assist with coaching clinics.

The cost of the first clinic in each province will be borne by the C.A.A. from the funds received from the Federal Government Grant.

1965 REGIONAL TOURNAMENTS

The 1965 Canadian champions will be decided this year by regional tournaments in each province. Provincial associations are to be advised that they should report the scores for the following events to the secretary of the Canadian Association.

- 56 Target Field Round
- 28 Target Canadian Hunters Round
- Canadian Round

It is expected that many provinces will hold these events in conjunction with their provincial championships and for that reason the program was kept to a minimum so that the provincial associations may add whatever other events they were in the habit of shooting.

REGIONAL TOURNAMENTS

The Grand Champion Awards will also be based on the foregoing events. However because of difficulty in supervising teams during regional tournaments, it was decided that the Team Championship Trophies would not be up for competition during the year when regional tournaments were held.

Due to the assistance that the C.A.A. may expect from the federal government, it was felt that this should be the last year in which Canadian champions were decided by regional tournaments. Unless special circumstances are present the C.A.A. should attempt to hold central championships each year.

1966 CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Another decision which the executive made at the Edmonton meeting was the location of the 1966 Canadian championship tournament. Calgary received 100% support in its bid. Vice-president Don Lovo has already a committee working on the tournament and has reported that the date will be early in July immediately prior to the famous Calgary Stampede. Archers will be able to take in the Canadian championships and stay on for the stampede. Now is the time to arrange your 1966 holidays.

1967 CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

The C.A.A. is now entertaining bids for the 1967 Canadian championship tournament. Any group wishing to host the tournament should write the secretary. The decision should be made by August 31st and most likely will be discussed at the general meeting which will be held in Winnipeg after the World Championship tournament team returns to Canada.

The host club will be asked to provide the target and field range. However it is likely that the C.A.A. will organize and run the tournament with assistance from the host club. Remember this is Canada's centennial year.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT FROM THE 1964 TOURNAMENT

To those archers who have asked the C.A.A. Secretary for a copy of the financial statement from the Joliette tournament, it must be reported that no financial statement has been received.

HONORARY LIFE MEMBER

The second archer to receive an honorary life membership in the Canadian Archery Association was chosen at the executive meeting in Edmonton. Dick Hesson who for many years has handled the chore of membership secretary was appointed honorary life member by a unanimous vote of the executive. Dick has been asked to assume the post of archives director and publicity man for the C.A.A.

NEW MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY

In order to streamline the operation of issuing membership cards and keeping the mailing list of the bulletin up to date, Terry Dickson will assume the position of Membership Secretary along with his other duties. Actually his wife Helen, will do most of the work, but send your memberships to Terry Dickson. By relieving Dick Hesson of this job, Dick will be free to concentrate on his new job of publicity.

REPORT FROM THE TREASURER

Since submitting the financial statement of January 31st, the C.A.A. has spent about as much as it has received (disregarding the grant from the federal government for the FITA team and coaching clinics). We have had extra heavy expenses with crests, 6-gold pins, Handbook, stationery, clerical help. In other words we held our own, with receipts amounting to \$300.00 and expenses about \$775.00. However we hope the projects started by most provincial associations to raise money for the FITA team will all be successful and that our bank account will grow by leaps and bounds. In an association such as the C.A.A. there are bound to be instances where membership cards have gone astray, etc., but I can assure you that every effort will be made to send you a membership card within three days of receipt of your membership fee.

Quite a number of members have asked when and if their membership expired. Please note that any member who has not received a membership card marked "1965" should send in his membership fee now. Commencing January 1, 1965, all memberships expired as of December 31, 1964. Those archers who hold membership cards showing an expiry date in 1965 should forward the balance necessary to extend their membership to Dec. 31, 1965. It won't be so complicated next year.

DEFINITION OF AN AMATEUR

Many archers have written the secretary requesting information regarding amateur standing. We quote below extract from the FITA rules and regulations on this subject:

10C Rule 26 — An amateur is one who participates and always has participated in sport as an avocation without material gain of any kind. He cannot avail himself of this qualification:

- If he has not a basic occupation designed to insure his present and future livelihood;
- If he receives or has received a remuneration for participating in sport;
- If he does not comply with the rules of the International Federation concerned, and the official interpretations of this rule.

A condensed version of the official interpretations indicates that the following are not eligible for International competitions:

Those who have capitalized in any way on their athletic fame or success, profited commercially therefrom or have accepted special inducements of any kind to participate; or those who have secured employment or promotion by reason of their sport performances rather than their ability, whether in commercial or industrial enterprises, the Services or any branches of press, theatre, television, cinema, radio, or any other paid activity.

Those who have participated for money, or who have converted prizes into money or without permission of the National Federation within the rules of the International Federation concerned, have received prizes exceeding 50 dollars in value, and those who have received presents which can be converted into money or other material advantages.

If an athlete is paid for the use of his name or picture or for a radio or television appearance, it is capitalization of athletic fame as described above.

Those who are paid for teaching or coaching others for competition in sports.

An athlete who demands payment or expense money for a manager, coach, relative or friend.

Those who have received payment of expenses in excess of the actual outlay.

Those whose occupation (studies or employment) has been interrupted for special training in a camp for over three weeks.

An individual who manufactures and sells equipment with his name thereon would not be considered an amateur.

FITA NEWS

FITA congress will be held during the world championships, July 19-24.

Twenty-four motions, many amending the FITA constitution, will be considered at the meetings. The Canadian Archery Association will have two delegates at the meetings. The following motions will be of interest to Canadian archers:

Article 310 (c) now reads: "No Member Association may enter more than 12 competitors." Motion: "No Member Association may enter more than four ladies and/or four gentlemen."

Art. 520 (FITA Star Badge Qualification) now reads, "Any archer belonging to a member association may apply for the award provided that he/she scores at least 1,000 points over a single FITA Round shot at a major tournament recognized by a member association, or any tournament recognized by FITA as an international tournament." Motion: "Member associations shall be held responsible that details of tournaments recognized by them for this purpose are forwarded to the General Secretary at least three months before the date of the tournament. No Member Association may recognize more than four tournaments in any one year."

Art. 302 Titles — Federation Royale Belge proposes that: "There shall be one Lady World Champion and one Gentleman World Champion at each distance. The highest scorer of all distances added will be Lady World Champion Grand Total and Gentleman World Champion Grand Total."

Art. 704 (c) now reads, "Trial shots are not allowed in any direction, on the shooting ground during the days of any competition." Proposal: "Three trial arrows may be shot at the longest distance. This to apply on the first day only."

603 (b) Teams, now reads, "Total, Single FITA Round for the best three archers from the same member association." Proposal: "The members of a team should be named in advance for all team competitions."

706 (h) now reads, "Unless all arrow holes are suitably on each occasion when arrows are scores, arrows rebounding from the target face shall not be scored." Proposal: "Where more than two archers shoot on a target, it should be allowed, at all tournaments, to reshot arrows that have rebounded from the target when such rebounding can be observed."

1965 MANITOBA INDOOR ARCHERY TOURNAMENT

Cliff Pearson, tournament chairman of the Manitoba Association of Archers has sent in the following bulletin on the BIG SHOOT in Winnipeg April 4th.

Location: Minto Armoury, Winnipeg
Time: 1:15 p.m.

The first round shot will constitute scores into which archers will be placed for the second round. There will be five classifications for the second round scoring, and archers will compete with other archers in the same range of scores for prizes. The score ranges of these five classifications will not be available to any archer competing, and will only be known at the end of the first round.

The aggregate score of the scores shot on the first and second round will determine the winners of the various trophies. The Manitoba championship trophies can be won only by Manitoba archers, and the Guest trophies by archers from out of the province.

C.A.A. president, Art Williams from Ladysmith, B.C. will act as Tournament Captain. Vice-president Don Lovo, Calgary, will be on the firing line. Archers from Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and B.C. have indicated that they will be on hand.

Hatts off to Cliff Pearson who has done a wonderful job organizing the tournament. The Bulletin will carry the full story of the results in the next issue.

1964 FITA MAIL MATCHES

A report received from FITA shows about 150 archers from all over the world shooting in the FITA Mail Matches in 1964. The High Lady was Kerstin Hamlund, Sweden, with a score of 1158. The High Man was J. Sandelin, Finland, with a score of 1201. 17 women and 45 men shot over the 1000 for the single FITA Round.

APPROVED SPORT — ARCHERY

A report from the Department of National Defence, Western Command, indicates that archery has now been accepted as an approved sport by the army. This will be a big boost for the sport and the C.A.A. would like to congratulate those army archers who have worked so hard toward this end. Both archery groups at the Fort Osborne Barracks, Winnipeg, and the Griesbach Barracks, Edmonton, spearheaded the campaign.
