A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

I would like to take this opportunity to review events in the FCA from Aug. in 1968 to the present.

Most of the FCA members are aware that there were a number of new executive members elected at Regina for the 1968-69 year. In addition to this the FCA had the misfortune of having TR Dickson step down from the post of Secretary after having been a member of the executive for 17 years. All of this had its telling effect on our organisatioal structure, and it has been an uphill climb to keep the FCA functioning properly. We have however, managed to fill most of the chairmanships and have been successful in keeping the following activities going:

- (1) Indoor Mail Matches - successfully run.
- (2) "Booster Button Campaign" -- to assist in sending a Canadian team to the World Championships in Valley Forge, Pa., USA.
- (3) Coaching Clinics -- Ron Genge, our clinic co-ordinator, has been doing a creditable job in organising Class "B" & Class "C" coaching clinics.
- (4) Grants from the Federal Government-- we have obtained the grants detailed in the last Bulletin.
- (5) 1969 Outdoor Championships-- Fred Usher is well on his way in the organization of the tournament, which takes place 14-18 July inclusive. The site is Victoria, BC. There is more detailed information elsewhere in this Bulletin.
- (6) Bulletin-- we finally had a volunteer to look after this very important phase of our sport. Best of luck to Harvey Hart in his endeavour.
- (7) Trophies: an effort is being made to refurbish our FCA trophies. Apparently they are in a deplorable state of repair and, Vi Muir, our trophy chairman, has made a great deal of progress in this regard. Carrying cases are being made for the shipping of these trophies. (Ed's note: All holders of FCA trophies read the article on trophies and please comply with Vi's wishes).
- (8) Printing of the Technical Manual & Rules & Regulations Handbook -- Terry Dickson has been active in looking after the issuing of these publications. Hopefully they will be ready for distribution in the not too distant future. We will keep members posted on this subject.

In closing, I would like to emphasize that our FCA membership for this year is only around the 300 mark. I urge all club executives to give this matter their consideration and encourage clubs to affiliate with the FCA and for individual members to join the FCA. Remember!!! the FCA is only as strong as the individuals and clubs that comprise its membership.

Notes on the FITA

The tournament at Valley Forge will be the 25th World Championship(Aug 12 to 16). In the past, one target world championship occured every two years. In the future there will be two target, two field and one Olympic Games FITA championship every four years. Archery, recognized as the second oldest sport and one of the earliest sports in the ancient olympics, has at last found its way into the modern Olympiad. The 26th World Archery Championships will be held in Great Britain and the 27th will be incorporated in the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich, Germany.

FITA medals and awards carry the FITA emblem: a 10 zone target face surmounted by a drawn bow, around which is the inscription, Federation International de tir a l'arc. Gilt, silver and bronze medals are used for the top

women, men and teams overall, as well as for the top three scores at each distance. At the last world championship 42 medals were awarded. Starting in 1969 36 medals will be awarded in the field.

The last world championship was held in Holland in 1967. Defending world champions as a result of that tournament will be Ray Rogers, USA and Maria Maczynska, Poland. In 1967 Canada placed as follows: Ladies- Carol Armstrong 15th, E Donaldson 19th, B McIntosh 22nd and Joan McDonald 39 th out of 56; Men- Don Jackson 9th, E Boucher 11th, E Ewert 38, E Barriere 49 out of 129. In that tourney 57,720 arrows were shot. M Bechdolt placed 6th and Hardy Ward 3rd. Both were juniors from the USA -proof that all should promote junior programs. E Boucher of Canada set a world record at 30 metres for men. Not a single 1200 Fita was shot then but several have been since. The proposed 1400 FITA Star is not too remote.

The FCA will send four female & four male archers, one coach, one manager and one chaperone to Valley Forge. Who will go will be decided at Victoria in July. Also to be decided there will be the competitors for the 1969 Ambassador's Cup. It will be held at Joliet, Quebec on the Labour Day weekend.

Hunters Round: 56 arrows

- 1 arrow from each of 4 posts or tgts
- 2 targets 5 to 15 metres (15 cm face)
- total distance 80 metres & 8 arrows.
- 4 targets 10 to 30 metres (30 cm face)
- total distance 320 metres & 16 arrows
- 5 targets 20 to 40 metres (45 cm face)
- total distance 600 " & 20 arrows
- 3 targets 30 to 50 metres (60 cm face)
- Total distance 480 " & 12 arrows.

The FITA round will consist of two units. In world championships the Hunters Round must have unmarked distances but the field will have the distance indicated. In field archery there are two classes: barebow and free style and the ladies may compete against the men, but gentlemen may not compete in ladies events. Unfortunately the FCA cannot afford to aid in financing any archers in the field events which are individual events only.

Profile of an Archer

Carol Armstrong

Carol Armstrong's interest in archery blossomed the same way it does for housewives. It's a simple husband-wife relationship: either share the sport with him or forget a bout him on the weekends. "That's right," Carol agrees. "Most archery tournaments are held on the weekends which means if your husband shoots and you do not, you stay home." Carol has been shooting competitively for only three years and has been the reigning champion for the last two. Carol earned a berth on the eight-member Canadian team for the World Championships in 1967. She placed 15th overall in a field of 52 women.

Not only is Carol Ann the Canadian women's champion, she also holds two native records- in the field competition and the hunter class. One of the numerous highlights in her relatively short but illustrious career came last September at the Ambassador Cup in Seattle. She became the first Canadian woman to win the 1100 shield in the FITA, and the very next day another Canadian, Betty McIntosh did it. At the same shoot Don Jackson set a world record for 70 metres - 311! Canadians are on the way up.

Carol considers herself a lot more fortunate than most amateur archers when it comes to coaching. "My husband, Floyd is my coach, and that really helps- he's right here to pick out any of my faults." Carol Ann shoots every day in her backyard where she has a 100 metre layout.

Carol went to Detroit this year and placed a creditable 10th in the amateurs.

After attending the Ontario Championships, to be held in Belleville on June 29, she will travel to scenic Victoria to defend her Canadian Championship. Then if all goes well, it will be off to Valley Forge and the World Championships. And the Ambassador Cup, too, held on the Labor Day weekend in Joliet, Quebec this year, may also find Carol in attendance. With her will be her husband who expects to be named as coach of the Canadian team.



Ever since she started to shoot competitively, Carol Ann has been forming some definite opinions about amateur sport in Canada. She is a firm believer that the hardest thing in the world is to be a good amateur. "That's when you are doing whatever you do for the love of it," she said. "It's a lot easier to work at something you're getting paid for." She also feels that a lack of money has prevented some "pretty good" archers from gaining any kind of recognition. "I tend to agree with skier Nancy Greene on a lot of things concerning amateur sport in Canada- Canadians are good athletes but we are a little bit behind the rest of the world - not so much in technique but in financial backing. But we are slowly starting to get more and more grants from the provincial and federal governments."

The Coaches Clinic

Une de nos nouvelles membres avait du trouble avec ses fleches tombant de la corde lorsqu'elle tirait. J'ai pris son arc et ses fleches pour lui montrer comment le faire correctement et les fleches sont tombees pour moi aussi, avec un visage un peu rouge, J'ai avec precaution essaye encore avec un meme resultat. Un examen revelait que le bourrelet etait tres doux et flexible et le point d'encochement etais tres epais. Les bourrelets elargissaient lorsqu'ils poussaient sur la corde et ils glissaient de la corde comme une graine de melon d'eau entre les doigts. Le bourrelet flexible ne casse pas mais ils causent du trouble. Le point d'encochement doit etre ajuste avec beaucoup d'attention et il y a des bourrelets que ne garderont pas leurs formes du tout. Il est mieux d'avoir des bourrelets qui brise, le cout est minime.

Grosse Mire: Parmi nous il y a quelques uns qui doivent se servir des verres pour lire. Sans verres je peux voir tres bien a une distance de 10 pieds mais je ne peux pas voir le cible. J'ai besoin d'une mire differente. Ce dont je me sers presentement est un disque de 3/8 de pouce de diametre avec un trou de 5/32 de pouce de centre. Cette mire a coupe la grandeur de mon groupement par la moitie, a grande distance l'or ou le blanc d'une cible de campagne apparait tout juste dans le trou de la mire, a courte distance, le disque est au centre du rouge ou blanc de la cible de campagne. Je me servais de cette idee quand je fabriquait des mires pour fusil. Si vous essayez une mire de cette sorte sur votre arc SVP laissez-moi savoir les resultats.

Question: Je viens d'acheter une nouvelle arc pour cible. Il n'y a pas de support pour fleche autre que le plateau de fleche. Aussi, il n'y a pas de plaque de fleche. Moi recommandez-vous un support de plumes ou un support disparaissant? Et si un support de plumes quoi-fois-je utiliser pour une plaque pour fleche? Est-ce-que cuir est satisfaisant?

Reponse: Le cuir cause beaucoup de friction qui ralentis vos fleches et n'est pas durable, mais n'est pas trop mal si imbibe a huile ou graise apres avoir l'attache a l'arc. Et maintenant je vais m'allonge le cou et donner mon opinion. Je n'ai jamais ete convaincu qu'un support mobile ou flexible est superieur a un support solide. Je les ai essaye sur une machine de tir, j'ai observe des experts sur la ligne de tir, j'ai vu leurs fleches baissaient un peu plus bas dans la cible que la fleche precedente et la suivante j'ai discute le support faible contre le support solide avec instructeurs plus informe que moi. Il y en a qui sont d'accord que le support solide est preferable. Il me semble que si la plaque a fleche doit etre solide donc le support doit etre solide aussi. Mais beaucoup d'experts, archers et instructeurs ne sont pas d'accord. Donc, il faut qu'on doit essayer plusieurs sortes de support.

Question: Je suis un chasseur a l'arc et j'ai des resultats assez bien mais je note que mes amies qui se servissent d'une mire ont de meilleur resultat. J'aimerais me servir d'une mire mais il n'y a pas de vrai fenetre de mire sur mon arc. Il y a seulement une conique de la largeur du membre vers le bas a la poignee, est-ce que je puis couper la partie epaisse du membre pour faire une fenetre? Je tite un arc Herter en verre de fibre solide, 52# @ 28".

Reponse: Ne coupez pas cet arc, vous pourriez le ruine et ce n'est pas necessaire. Vous avez du tire instinctivement avec l'arcpenche a une certaine angle. Vous savez que la fleche va dans la direction pointe sans regard pour l'angle a laquelle l'arc est tenu, la distant variant avec l'elevation de la fleche. Il est apparent donc qui si l'arc est penche a l'angle normal et qui la mire la mire est ajuste de tel facon que le guide de la mire est vertical et que la pointe de la mire est au dessus de la fleche, vous pouvez tire a votre maniere habituelle mais en vous servant de la mire. En tout cas ce n'est pas pratique d'avoir la mire eloigne ou a un angle eloigne de l'arc. Simplement ajustez le guide de la mire parallele avec le cote conique de l'arc et visez avec le guide tenu verticalement. Je vous suggere se servir d'une mire avec plusieurs de pointes fixes- chacune etre ajuste pour une distance donne. Quand vous chasser- ez vous n'aurez pas ajustir la mire pour distance. Les distances autre que les distances fixe peuvent juger entre les distances fixe.
