## 6. Canada's Olympic/Paralympic Team to Undergo Doping Control Prior to Athens Games

The Canadian Centre for Ethics in Sport (CCES) has initiated its Pre-Games Testing Policy to provide doping control and education services to all Canadian participants in the 2004 Summer Games in Athens, Greece. During the six months leading up to the August event, the CCES aims to test 100% of Canada's Olympic and Paralympic team,

and to reach the majority with education sessions.

"Our pre-games testing program is designed to ensure that Canadian athletes compete clean," said Paul Melia, CEO of the CCES. "The program is as much about providing our athletes with accurate and up-to-date information as it is about recognizing that the temptation to dope is never higher than during this crucial time period."

As part of Canada's Doping Control Program, the Pre-Games Testing Policy implements a dedicated testing program to increase the deterrent to using banned substances and methods in the high-risk period prior to the games. Canadian athletes will be reached through a combination of in-competition and out-of-competition testing throughout the six-month period, with consideration given to the testing programs of international sport federations and the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) when coordinating tests.

A significant educational component is incorporated into the CCES Pre-Games Testing Policy. With the cooperation of the Canadian Olympic Committee (COC) and the Canadian Paralympic Committee (CPC), the CCES complements its pre-games testing with direct information sessions for the majority of Athens-bound athletes. Athletes will be informed of their rights and responsibilities related to doping control, walked through doping control procedures, updated on supplements and the 2004 WADA List of Prohibited Substances, and apprised of upcoming changes to Canada's Doping Control Program. Some sessions will be held abroad at competitions, training camps, and other settings where teams are centralized. Educational initiatives are supported by the CCES' substance inquiry service, which responds to medication and supplement inquiries on an ongoing basis.

Since the inception of the Pre-Games Testing Policy, the CCES has provided testing and education services to major games athletes prior to the 2001 World Athletics Championships, the 2001 Francophone Games, the 2002 Winter Olympics/ Paralympics, the 2002 Commonwealth Games, and the 2003 Pan American Games.

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## **7. CAAWS MARKS INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY**

Two representatives from CAAWS marked International Women's Day on March 8th by attending the 3rd World Conference on Women and Sport in Marrakech, Morocco, organized by the International Olympic Committee (IOC). Chair of the CAAWS Board of Directors, Phyllis Berck of Toronto, and Executive Director, Karin Lofstom of Ottawa, participated in the conference.

The theme for the March 7-9 conference was New Strategies, New Commitments. Two Canadian women were also presenters: Ottawa's Marg McGregor, CEO of Canadian Interuniversity Sport chaired a session on The Role of Role Models, and spoke to the issue of Sexual Harassment in Sport; IOC member Charmaine Crooks of Vancouver presented on Television & Women's Sport during the Media Exposure session.

The conference was well attended with over 600 delegates from 137 countries, and

provided an interesting look at what is happening around the world in the area of women and sport. As Lofstrom explained, "The conference gave us a chance to continue to develop relationships with others working in the area of women and sport. In many ways Canada is more progressive in women and sport. CAAWS is looking at opportunities where we can assist internationally in supporting other countries' development of women leaders. We are looking at potentially promoting our newly revised women and leadership program within the Pan American Sport Organizations."

In Canada, International Women's Week (IWW) was celebrated from Sunday, March 7 to Saturday, March 13, 2004, using the theme She's on a Role! This year's theme encouraged Canadians to take a closer look at the accomplishments of many Canadian women, from athletes to social activists, to promote gender equality and build Canada into the country it is today, as well as celebrating the many women who continue to work towards these goals.

#### CAAWS BOARD MEMBER WINS INTERNATIONAL AWARD

To celebrate International Women's Day on March 8th, Lilo Ljubisic was awarded the International Isabel Ferrer Prize by the Valencian Government (Spain) on behalf of the European Commission, in recognition of the 2004 International Year for Education and Sport. The award recognizes women who have contributed to equality between men and women. It is given to women with international and deserved recognition in working in social fields and who have strongly worked in defending human rights. The European Commission set 2004 as the International Year of Education and Sport and the Valencian Government is dedicating the awards to women in sport.

Ljiljana (Lilo) Ljubisic is a 5-time Paralympic blind athlete who has successfully represented Canada at the international level of athletics for two decades. Her career highlights include double world record holder in both shot put and discus for blind women, an amazing 19 international podium finishes, including 3 bronze, 2 silver and one gold Paralympic medals. Also a Board member of Athletes CAN since 1994, she joined the CAAWS Board in 2003.

#### CAAWS SPEAKS AT HALIFAX CONFERENCE

CAAWS Chair Phyllis Berck and Executive Director Karin Lofstrom will be presenting at a conference held in conjunction with the Women's World Hockey Championships in Halifax, NS. The March 26-28, 2004 conference features presentations around the theme: Women's Hockey: Gender Issues On and Off the Ice. Karin and Phyllis' presentation Homophobia - Seeing the Invisible, Talking about the Unspoken will incorporate a research paper, Homophobia and the Female Athlete, written by Sandra Kirby, PhD, as well as focus group discussions that CAAWS conducted across Canada on homophobia. Their goal is to initiate discussion on an issue that still remains undiscussed in many circles, and to look at potential steps for the future to educate administrators, coaches, volunteers, and parents around the issue of Homophobia.

While in Halifax, CAAWS will also hold its Board Meeting. As well, while in the Eastern Canada, CAAWS Board members and staff will be involved in delivering Leadership training in Halifax and Truro, N.S. and CAAWS / On the Move Workshops in Summerside, PEI and Moncton, NB.
