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## **2. Announcing Canada's 2004 Olympic Archery Team**

Don Lohnes, President of the Federation of Canadian Archers (FCA), has the pleasure of announcing the approved nomination of the following archers by the Canadian Olympic Committee to represent Canada at the Athens Olympic Games in August:

WOMEN: Marie-Pier Beaudet Racheal Savage (1<sup>ST</sup> standby)

MEN: Jonathan Ohayon

The Olympic archery event takes place August 12-31, 2004. The archery competition will be held at the ancient Panathinaiko stadium (Kallimarmaro). This is the same stadium where the first Olympic Games of the modern era were held in 1896, built on the same site as the stadium of antiquity dating from 329 BC. You can find more information about the 2004 Olympic Games at [athens2004.com](http://athens2004.com).

These archers have worked unceasingly to hone their skills over the past four years and, for the first time since 1988, Canada will be represented by a female and male archer at the Olympic Games. The Canadian archers Rachel Savage and Rob Rusnov won places for the Canadian team during a qualification tournament in Colombia, South America last September. Marie-Pier and Jonathan obtained a place on the Canadian team through a qualification process and trials in accordance with Schedule A of the COC. The Federation of Canadian Archers wishes all possible success to these athletes at the Olympic Games and wait impatiently for competitive results.

Go, TEAMS!

At the last Junior World Championship in Nymburk, Czech Republic in 2002, a team of 4 archers represented Canada. This year's team of 16 is a remarkable improvement. The USA has a complete team of 32 (the maximum allowed is 4 in each category) and there are a couple of teams with 20 or so members, so Canada has one of the larger teams at this competition.

Crispin and I left Canada via KLM on July 15th and had an uneventful flight to Amsterdam. Normally, people from the organising committee meet arriving competitors - but not this time and after waiting around for about an hour we phone a number supplied by Susan Lemke and eventually someone came to collect us with a "people mover" (translation - a normal van) and off we went.

After about a 50-minute drive, we entered the Lillehall National Sport Centre through an impressive wrought-iron gate with a large gold crest on it. It was down a long driveway of at least a kilometre with beautifully manicured grass on either side, tall hedges and

superb 30 foot cedar trees. Weather in England has been wet and cool and obviously the grass is delighted with it.

Lilleshall Hall was built by the Marquis of Stafford as a hunting lodge in 1829. After the Second World War the Hall, and grounds were presented to the Nation by the Government of South Africa as a recreation Centre. It is now owned by Sport England and used for a wide range of sports, but particularly for soccer and archery. It now includes numerous soccer pitches of varying sizes, all meticulously groomed as well as a gymnastic training hall, several gyms, squash courts, lawn bowling pitches, weight training rooms and 35 acres of gardens, soccer pitches and archery ranges. The GNAS (Grand National Archery Society) has its office here and most national archery tournaments are held here.

It was originally built as a hunting lodge, but don't mistake this with your picture of a hunting lodge in Canada. The original stone building is enormous and more fits the description of a grand English country home - the kind you see in movies.

We drove into the back of this house and then through a large stone arch to a parking area and dropped off the three judges who will stay in the centre during the competition. We then drove another 25 minutes of Harper Adams University College near the town of Newport. We were obviously some of the first to arrive and had to hunt a bit to find the organizing committee and get our room assignments and keys.

Harper Adams University College is a small agricultural school with rooms for about 300 students. Accommodation is only in single rooms, a decent size and not bad. There are however, no phones and no computer connections. The lady who checked us in told us that this tournament will have about 430 competitors which is much larger than they anticipated which means that some athletes will be staying in other schools in the area.

We went to a small cafeteria where we had a light lunch of a variety of finger food and found Maciej and Darcy Graham. Maciej had a car and we decided to visit the town of Newport. We parked and walked and explored a small, typical English town. We particularly noticed all the flower boxes on all the windows of the shops and houses and how clean and well cared for the town was.

After exhausting ourselves, we returned to the University to find that several more people had arrived and that meals were now being served in the main dining room. We were surprised that our fearless leader, Susan Lemke had not arrived yet, because on our schedule she should have been here by now. Jeff and Allan Gunter arrived at dinnertime and also wondered about Susan since they were to meet her in London and come together by train, but she did not appear.

July 17-18, 2004

These two days had the same schedule. Jay Lyon arrived on the 17th through the Manchester airport but without his bow. He was picked up at the airport and delivered to Harper Adams by his uncle who lives near by and his uncle took over working to get his bow. It arrived on the next flight on the 18th and he was in business.

By noon on the 17th we were concerned about Susan and the archers travelling with her as they did not appear - however we got a message saying that she was "lost" and would be found soon and sure enough in the early afternoon they all appeared. Her flight from Vancouver stopped in Calgary and then flew straight to London. In Calgary, her flight was delayed by 3 hours because of very stormy weather. This meant that they

missed their train London. So they improvised and took a several trains with several changes heading towards Newport - the small town about 40 minutes from the University. However, at one of the train changes, she asked for directions to Newport and the stationmaster understood Newport in Wales and instead of going northeast. She ended up on a train going southwest heading for Wales. After some time and much map studying, they decided they were going the wrong direction and got off the train at the next town. It was now about 11pm. They decided to find a hotel and stay the night. While walking to the hotel, they ran into the parents of an archer that Susan used to coach in Vancouver a number of years ago!! Susan could barely believe her eyes. They invited the ragged group into their home and after a good nights sleep and a hearty breakfast, put them on a train going in the right direction and they finally made it to Newport and the University!!.

On the morning of the 18th, Marie-Pier, Stephanie and Kristel arrived and our team was complete. Practice was getting very crowded and we now have to book time on the practice range.

On the 18th starting at about 2:30pm all the teams were dressed in their uniforms and and boarding buses to Lillehall for the opening ceremony. The shooting field is surrounded by trees, is startlingly green with beautiful grass - the kind that is urging you to take your shoes and socks off and walk in bare feet.

Each country has been adopted by a school in the local area and the kids in the schools have made a "Gonfalon" for each team with the flag of the country and other insignia on it. This will be carried by two students from the team's school in place of the country's flag. A "Gonfalon" is an old English style of banner that is shield shaped and hangs from a decorated shaft by the loops on the top of the Gonfalon. It was a wonderful addition to the ceremony.

The march in of teams looked great. Chairs were provided for the Athletes to sit in and welcome speeches were made by Jim Easton and Lord Sebastian Coe, a famous 1500 meter champion and Olympic Gold Medalist and now chairman of the London 2012 committee bidding for the 2012 Olympic Games. I was thrilled to bits to meet and chat with Sebastian Coe - he is one of the greats of track and field and a fascinating person to talk with.

Buses are an issue here. There aren't enough of them to move all the archers quickly. This was clearly evident after the opening ceremonies - about 4 or 5 buses would be filled and go back to the University and then return for more archers. All in all it took four trips to get them all. Susan and I waited until the bitter end - a long time.

July 19, 2004-07-21

Today is "official practice day". This is the only day that the archers get to practice on the actual tournament field. We were up at 6:30 am and on board a bus at 7:30am. Again there are only 3 buses, which means that all the athletes are moved in shifts. In the morning all the juniors are allowed to practice, in the afternoon all the cadets will practice. So we ended up at the range at about 8:15 when practice didn't start until 9:30. Again it was cloudy and chilly, but part way through the morning the sun started to poke through.

In the athlete's area behind the shooting line, the organizers have erected tents for the archers. The tents have walls on them, which ends up creating a solid wall so that the

public that is standing outside behind the fence or in the stands can't see a single thing. Not exactly smart!!

Because age is an issue at this tournament, all the archers have to present their passports at the time they have their equipment inspected to ensure that they are in the correct equipment category. Sure enough, 3 archers did not bring them. I was detailed to find a way back to the University and get them. I used one of my good Olympic pins to "encourage" a security person to help and as we were getting into the car to leave, several other archers (not Canadian) came looking for a ride for the same reason!

July 20th

No one needed their alarm clocks this morning. Everyone was up early, at breakfast early and ready to get on the bus at 7:30. Practice started at 8:30 so the timing wasn't too bad. It was pretty cold and I had to make another run from the field back to the University to get additional sweaters and jackets for everyone - good thing I always have a collection of pins with me! Besides being very chilly, there was a worrisome wind from behind. During the morning the wind continued to slowly increase until the end of the second distance it was quite strong. It did warm up during the day - but no one is wearing shorts and T-shirts that's for sure!

The tournament field has 65 targets which isn't enough for three archers per target and one line of shooting, so the tournament will be very slow with two lines and AB, CD shooting.

The first long distance (90m for men and 70m for women) went smoothly. Generally, the Canadians shot well with some scores a little below average. Megan Kennedy (compound women) spent most of the distance in 5th place and Ryan Flannigan and Michael Schleppe floated from 5th to 10th.

At the second long distance (70m for the men and 60m for women) wasn't quite so kind to Megan and she drifted down the leader board, but Ashley Wallace held her own and finished the first half in 10th place with a 652 half. Megan ended up in 22nd place with a 634 half and Emerald Lemke was consistent and finished in 25th place.

In the compound men, Michael Schleppe overtook Ryan Flannigan finished with a 661 half in 7th place while Ryan had a 652 half and was in 10th place - an excellent result for both of them. Allan Gunter shot close to his average with 618 and was in 39th place.

In the recurve women, Marie-Pier Beaudet shot steadily and had a 619 half, which put her in 24th place. The first place Korean has a half 669 - that sure amazed everyone - especially the compound shooters that she pasted!!

In the recurve men, Crispin was not happy with his results, particularly 90m where he shot a 282. He finished with a 593 half and was in 25th place. Jay struggled but worked hard to maintain a positive attitude and to shoot better arrows. His half is 582 and he's in 45th place.

Shooting finished about 1pm. All the juniors had to clear the field before the cadets could enter, so in fact the cadets didn't start to score until nearly 2:30. We watched the cadets shooting for a while and then went back to the University. We all talked for a bit, then shot a bit and generally whittled away the time. The cadets eventually returned about 7pm and Susan, Jeff and Karen didn't get back until nearly 8:30 on much later buses. Long days for them for sure.

Sorry, I don't have all the placings for the cadets, but I do know that Doris Jones of Manitoba (compound girls) is in 2nd place, as is Evan Winslow from Ontario - quite exciting!
