3. The Coaching Association of Canada (CAC)

The Coaching Association of Canada will launch a new phase of its National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) on April 1, 2004, which will have a significant impact on how volunteer coaches are trained and developed in every community across Canada.

Each year, more than 39,000 coaches take part in an NCCP course in nearly 900 communities in Canada. This newly designed phase of the program will impact approximately 25,000 per year of those coaches by introducing new content and new training methods. The NCCP has been Canada's recognized coach training and certification program for coaches in over 60 sports since 1974. It has made Canada a world leader in coaching education and training. Since its inception, nearly one million Canadians have taken part in the program.

With the changes, the NCCP is now moving towards a competency-based approach where coaches are trained specifically in job tasks relevant to the participants that they are coaching and can be evaluated on performances to a specified standard.

"This new phase of the program is specifically designed to meet the needs of the volunteer coaches at the community, club, and junior high school levels by teaching them how to plan safe and effective practices, design meaningful season plans, teach appropriate sport skills to athletes, and many other important aspects of coaching" said John Bales, CAC President. "It will provide them with practical, hands-on information on how to supervise young participants and provide drills and basic coaching skills that coaches can use." The new program results in a more positive sport experience for the participant. This will help to ensure that they stay in sport longer, thereby helping to combat potential long-term effects of inactivity such as obesity.

CAC and its partners are in the process of redesigning the NCCP to better meet the needs of coaches across all levels of participation and competition. The next phase of the transition will be launched in October 2004 focusing on the community sport coach at the introductory level.

The Coaching Association of Canada's mission is to enhance the sport experience of Canadian youth through quality coaching. Proud sponsors of the Coaching Association of Canada and its programs include Investors Group, TSN, and Petro-Canada.

The National Coaching Certification Program is a collaborative program of the government of Canada, provincial/territorial governments, national/provincial/territorial sport federations, and the Coaching Association of Canada.

An Overview of the National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP)

-The NCCP provides quality training and certification to Canada's coaches in more than 60 sports. The program is moving towards a competency-based approach where coaches are:

- o trained in NCCP outcomes relevant to the participants that they are coaching

o evaluated by demonstrating coaching outcomes to a specified standard

-The core competencies of coaching are valuing, interacting, leading, problem-solving, and critical thinking. These competencies will be woven throughout all NCCP training and evaluation activities.

Competency-based education and training:

-Once the transition to a competency-based approach is complete, the NCCP will be a program that trains and certifies coaches based on proven abilities to do certain things deemed important to meet the needs of the participants they coach. These changes will result in significant improvements to the NCCP.

The new NCCP:

-The new structure of the NCCP is designed to take into account the different types of coaches who contribute to the Canadian sport system and the environment or context in which they coach.

-The three streams are:

- o Community Sport
- o Competition
- o Instruction

-The NCCP will provide training to coaches in the following areas:

- o making ethical decisions
- o planning a practice
- o designing a basic sport program
- o analyzing performance
- o providing support to athletes in training
- o supporting the competitive experience
- o managing a program.

-The NCCP provides three stages of accreditation to coaches in the context in which they are working:

- o IN TRAINING: coach has begun training, however some training still to occur
- o TRAINED: coach has completed all required training activities for a particular context
- o CERTIFIED coach has successfully completed all required evaluation activities for a particular context

Competition Introduction (Comp-Int):

-Competition Introduction is a series of multi-sport modules for coaches who train children or adolescents basic sport skills in a fun and safe environment and who are preparing them for local and/or regional competitions.

-These modules will replace the old Levels 1 and 2 Theory courses and are the first step towards a competency-based approach to coach education and training.

Women & Sport

IOC CONFERENCE, 7-9 MARCH 2004

FITA was represented at the 3rd IOC Conference on Women & Sport held in Marrakech, Morocco, from 7 to 9 March 2004 by Mrs. Lynne Evans, Council Member. The conference attracted 600 delegates representing 137 different countries of which about 25% were men. The majority of delegates were from women and sport commissions (NOCs or Non Governmental Organisations), and 11 International Federations were represented. Lynne Evans addressed the conference in respect of the Loughborough Report on Women Leadership & the Olympic Movement, as well as in respect of FITA's performance in meeting the targets set by IOC.

The keynote speech by Jacques Rogge, IOC President, included reference to the fact that the IOC itself is below the threshold of the minimum targets of women in senior decision making roles (12 women out of 126 IOC Members). In comparison 8 International Federations (including FITA) are in compliance with the targets set.

During the conference Lynne Evans got into contact with the Secretary General of the Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF) and the Joint Secretary General of the NOC of Indian who were both very positive regarding the future of Archery on the Commonwealth Games programme in 2010 and 2014. The CGF kindly accepted the invitation for their General Assembly delegates to attend the Archery event in the Panathinaiko Stadium in Athens.

The next IOC Conference on Women & Sport will be held in 2008 (bids to host it already received). The International Women & Sport Organisation will next host its Conference in Japan in 2006.

8. See You In Athens Fund

FIRST National Promotion in Support of Canadian Athletes!

Molson Canada will conduct a one-day promotion on April 3 to encourage Canadians to support amateur athletes. The initiative, called "Spring Forward," will coincide with the start of daylight savings time. That day, five dollars from every 24-case of Molson Canadian beer sold will be donated to the See You In Athens Fund. The promotion will run nationally, excluding Quebec, New Brunswick and Newfoundland and Labrador.

The See You In Athens Fund is a not-for-profit organization that raises money and awareness for Canadian amateur athletes to help prepare them for international summer and winter games. "Spring Forward" and in return support our Canadian Athletes. Go get your case of Molson Canadian next Saturday April 3rd!!!

9. FCA at the Olympic Games

Last September in Colombia Canada qualified a place for one man and one woman on the shooting line at the Athens Olympics.

Even though Canada has earned those places through international competition, Canadian archers still have to meet a standard set by the Canadian Olympic Committee (COC). The COC has set a general standard for all Canadian athletes that they have to have a demonstrated ability to place in the top 12 at the Olympic Games before the COC will send them to the Games. They negotiate what that means in terms of speed, score, points, placings etc. with each Olympic sport. This standard for archery involves both a placing and score which has to be accomplished three times in seven designated tournaments. The Arizona Cup is one of those tournaments.

The Arizona Cup will be shot March 31 - April 3rd and has about 260 archers from 12 countries competing. On March 27 - 28 there was a smaller tournament at the same site that many people used as a warm up for the Arizona Cup.
