Activate 2005 Application Deadline Extended

Young people will be back to play a role in the development of the future of sport in Canada at ACTIVATE 2005 scheduled for November 9-13 in Quebec City. Once again, this gathering of 40 young people from coast to coast to coast will be held during the Petro Canada Leadership Sportif 2005 where they will have the opportunity to share their ideas about the current and future roles of Canadian sport.

Canadian youth want to do more than just speak out about sport. They are ready to become positive change agents within their communities through sport! The ACTIVATE 2005 youth leadership conference will give young people aged 16-25 the platform they deserve to make their voices heard! Key findings from the 2004 conference which were identified as contributing to the development of youth through sport included:

- ? Young people need to be empowered in the creation of activities/leagues so that they can accept responsibility for their own participation in them.
- ? Role models and mentoring are important reasons for young people to stay involved with sport and physical activity.
- ? A broader definition of sport and physical activity is needed so its impact can be expanded.
- ? Society does not value sport and physical and activity and young people need to be a part of changing and improving that perspective.
- ? Structured environments can deter participation in sport and physical activity and options need to be provided.
- ? Collaboration and networking are critical to the advancement of sport and physical activity from playground to podium. We need to ask ourselves who isn't at the table and get them involved.
- ? Inclusion and a welcoming environment will contribute to increased levels of sport and physical activity. We need to stop engineering physical inactivity.
- ? Initiative is needed from all participants to ensure that funding is adequate at all levels.

ACTIVATE 2005 is not just about speaking out – it is about taking action! The Esteem Team Association encourages all individuals and organizations to assist young people in their efforts towards becoming positive change agents within their communities through sport. 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7. FITA Beginner Awards

FITA is pleased to propose a program enhancing the will of practicing well among the beginners during the long apprenticeship period; i.e. before that beginner archers could challenge the other FITA awards that can be only won at registered FITA tournaments (hence at too long shooting distances for the novices).

Intermediate and Advanced archers are eligible to win some awards such as the FITA Star pins, the Arrowhead pins... Even the lowest of these awards require several months or years of practice; hence awards for the beginners allowing them to assess their progress during a long period of time were missing.

8. Women in Coaching

National Team Coaching Apprenticeship Programme

The programme is based upon the matching of an apprentice coach with a national coach and/or a mentor coach who has a formal link to the national team programme. The national coach, apprentice coach and mentor coach, in consultation with the Coaching Association of Canada, will determine the role that the apprentice coach will play at major games. The apprenticeship programme will be structured to meet the needs of each coach selected to the programme and to enable an experience that will benefit both the candidate and the national team with which they become involved. This will be accomplished through the implementation of an approved personalized two-year Learning Plan developed by the national coach, apprentice coach and mentor coach. The opportunity to link with women coaches in other sports will be provided through participation in national coach and other specific workshops.
