The Canadian Olympic Committee (COC) announced that a total of 470 athletes along with 272 coaches, team leaders and support team members will represent Canada at the 2007 Pan American Games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil from July 13 to 29. An online team handbook, with sport descriptions and biographies of all Canadian athletes as well as a searchable database of all of Canada's 2007 Pan American Games team members, is available at http://www.olympic.ca/EN/2007rio/2007_handbook/nav.html.

Canada's 2007 Pan American Games athlete delegation is this nation's second largest at any multi-sport Games, trailing only the 618 athletes that participated at the 1999 Pan American Games in Winnipeg.

An estimated 5,500 athletes from 42 countries of North, South and Central America and the Caribbean will compete in a total of 33 sports at the 2007 Pan American Games.

1. Dietmar Trillus – World Champion!

For the second time in 2 years, a Canadian compound archer is a world champion! This time it was Dietmar Trillus (King City, ON) who won top honours. Congratulations!

Dietmar finished the qualification round in 32nd place and was seeded 1st going into the semi-finals. The crowd was very enthusiastic during the finals and cameras were going off every time he drew an arrow. He defeated Martin Damsbro (DEN) in the semi-finals and faced Braden Gellenthien (USA) in the finals. Both men shot very well and tied. In the sudden death shoot-off, Braden shot first – a 9. Dietmar drilled a 10! It was a tremendous moment for Dietmar, and because he was born in Germany and still speaks German, he had the extra pressure of interviews in German as well as in English.

Semi-final: Trillus (CAN) – Damsbo (DEN)

Damsbo started first on target no. 2. He opened the match with 9-10-9 (28). Trillus, shooting on target 1, scored 10-10-9 (29) for a 1-point lead. They both went on with a 10-9-9 series and the score was still to the Canadian's advantage for one point (57-56). The lead was still for him (86-85) after he scored 10-10-9 and Damsbo 9-10-10. The Dane could unfortunately not recover this one point disadvantage and left victory to his opponent (114-113). Trillus will be shooting for gold, while Damsbo will compete for bronze.



Gold Medal: Trillus (CAN) – Gellenthien (USA)

Both archers were tied at 29 after the first end, as Gellenthien started with 10-10-9 and Trillus with 9-10-10. The two archers looked a bit stressed shooting for the world title... They both continued with 28 points in the second end for a tied score of 57 points. The Canadian and the American even increased their shooting level in the second part, shooting a perfect triple 10 series for the same total of 87 each! Gellenthien took the lead with one arrow to go, after he shot 10-10 and his opponent 9-10. He shot a 9, however, with his last arrow, and Trillus scoring a 10 could tie the match (116-116). Gellenthien was shooting first in the shoot-off and he scored a 9, leaving a possible victory to his opponent... The Canadian managed to hold his nerves and released a perfect last arrow to become the new World Champion in Compound Men!

2. Canada's Recurve Men Finish 8th and win 3 spots for Beijing Olympics

Canadian recurve men had their most successful world championships ever with all 3 team members shooting scores of +1310 at the 44th FITA World Target Championships held in Leipzig, GER July 08-15.

No Canadian recurve archer had ever shot over 1300 during a world championship – and now there were 3! Congratulations to Jay Lyon (Winnipeg, MB), Hugh MacDonald (Vancouver, BC) and Crispin Duenas (Toronto, ON) who finished 29th, 32nd, and 33rd respectively in the qualification round.

Unfortunately, this meant that Crispin and Hugh met each other in the second elimination round. All 3 men shot well and Jay and Crispin won Olympic spots individually.

However, as a team, they ranked higher than the American men for the first time at a world championship, finishing 9th and beat the Mexicans to earn the maximum number of Olympic spots! The Canadians were defeated by the Korean men and finished ranked 8th. Congratulations! Good luck in Rio!

1/8 final: Canada (9) - Mexico (8)

The Canadian archers made their way to the Olympics! This is an amazing result for them. After ranking 9th in the qualifications Canada had to face no. 8 Mexico for one of the most uncertain matches of this first Recurve Men round. The match was tight after the first end, with Canada achieving a small advantage of 2 points over Mexico (55-53). They then managed to increase their lead to 111-105 and 164-154 to shelter themselves from any nasty surprises. Canada finally clinched victory and three Olympic places by 220-207.

Teams qualified for the Olympics

The eight winners of the 1/8 finals have secured three Olympic places each. They are: Korea, Canada, Ukraine, Chinese Taipei, Italy, Poland, USA and Great Britain. Since the host country China lost in the first round today, only the top 8 countries in Leipzig (quarter-finalists) get three spots for the 2008 Olympics in Beijing. There is, therefore, no lucky loser in Recurve Men!

3. Canada's Compound Men Finish 5th against the Ozzies

The team of Kevin Tataryn (Stonewall, MB), Dietmar Trillus (King City, ON) and Kevin Brayford (Calgary, AB) finished 20th, 32nd and 55th during the qualification round at the FITA World Target Championships in Leipzig, GER July 08-15 giving them enough points to be ranked 10th place in the team event. They won their first elimination match against the team from the Islamic Republic of Iran but went down to defeat against the powerful, successful Australian men's team. The Canadians' score during this match was high enough to earn them 5th place overall! Congratulations!

Not only did the team place well, but each team member shot very well during the individual championship. Dietmar Trillus won the gold medal! Kevin Tataryn placed 8th and Kevin Brayford placed 19th with some excellent match play shooting.

Canada's Women Compound Team puts up good showing against Russian world record-holders

The Canadian women's compound team members were Ashley Wallace (Redcliff, AB), Dawn Groszko (Calgary, AB) and Marie-Michèle Quirion (St-Simon-les-Mines, QC). For Ashley and Marie-Michèle, this was their first senior world championship. As a team, the women placed 14th after the qualification round. That meant the Canadians had to face the reigning world record-holders from Russia. It was a good match, but unfortunately, Canada came up short and was eliminated, staying in 14th place.

Individually, Dawn finished 1 point ahead of Ashley for 32nd place, which meant that the two archers faced each other in the second elimination round. Ashley went on to finish 17th, Dawn finished 40th and Marie-Michèle was 69th. Congratulations to Canada's compound women!

4. Marie-Pier Beudet Finishes 39th – best senior female recurve archer at world target championships since 1983

Not since Linda Kazienko finished 4th at the 1983 World Championships in Long Beach, USA has a Canadian woman placed as high as Marie-Pier Beudet (Lévis, QC) did at the 44th FITA World Target Championships in Leipzig, GER this year.

Marie-Pier finished the qualification round in 58th spot and through her two successful elimination rounds, moved up the list to finish 39th. Congratulations, Marie-Pier!

Marie-Pier was not the only Canadian recurve woman with a good performance at these championships. Kateri Vrakking (Toronto, ON), participating in her first world championships, shot a personal best at 70M. Congratulations! Kristen Niles (Edmonton, AB), who was competing at the world championships for the first time also, shot the second highest FITA 1440 score of her life during this event. Well done, Kristen!

Marie-Pier, Kristen and Kateri are preparing in Rio for the archery event at the Pan Am Games. Good luck to each of you!

Developing Female Leadership in the Canadian Sport System: Recommendations for High-Level Sport Organizations

Few would disagree with the contention that women's leadership differs from that of men. Difference, of course, does not imply inferiority. Difference can be, and often is, positive. But because there are precious few examples of women leaders within the context of Canadian sport, there is, consequently, little opportunity to put women's leadership to the test. Yes, of course, there are some exemplary role models. But a close examination of the administration, boards of directors, and committees of sport organizations reveals a lingering leadership imbalance, particularly when one factors in the recent outstanding, dominating performances of Canada's women athletes and coaches on that great testing ground, the world stage.
